Some of these students work hard, others not so hard. Some of them are only a part of campus life for a short time while others come back for more. Each of them plays his part in the life of Fort Hays State.

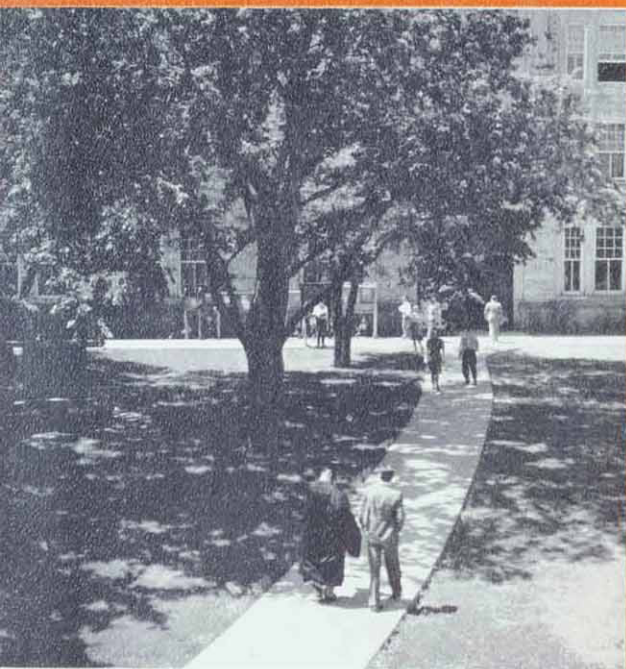

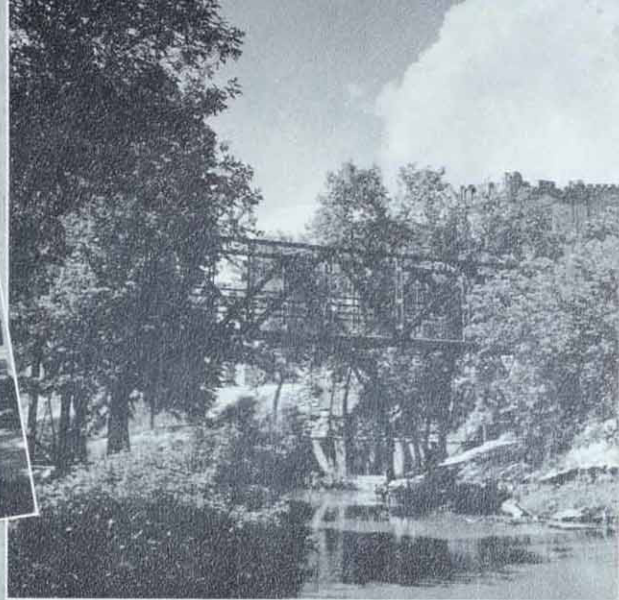


Fort Hays Campus

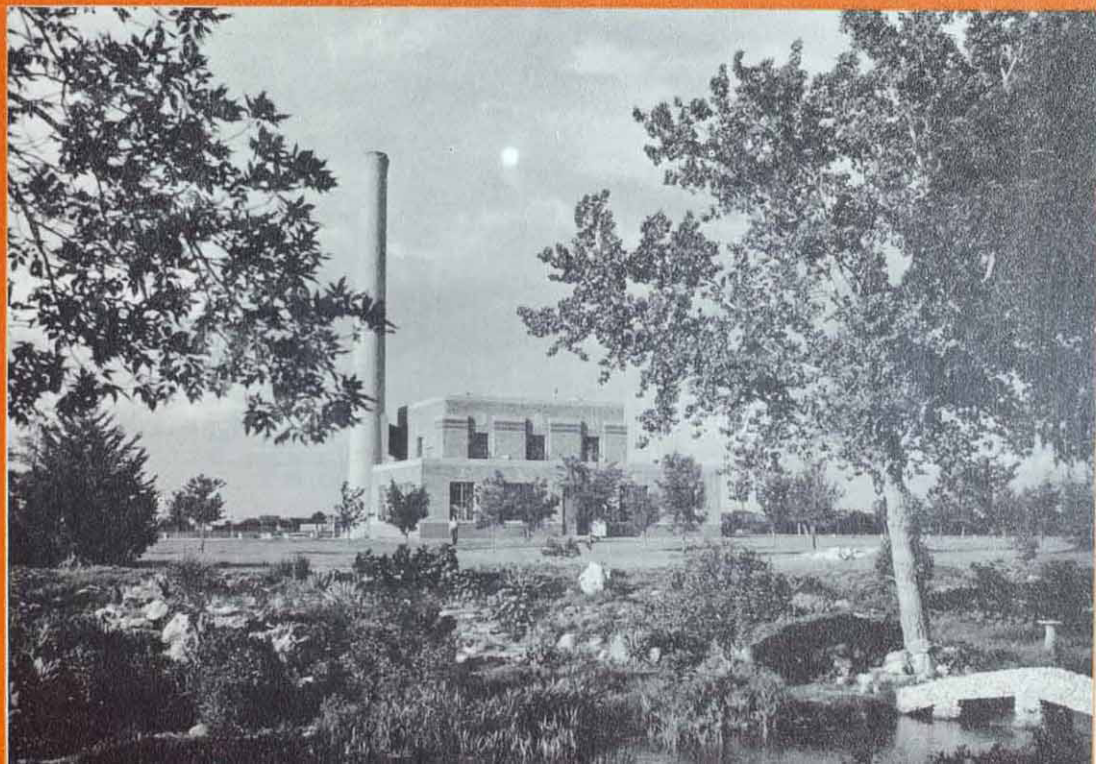


The Fort Hays campus, with its winding walks, forest of trees, and native stone buildings, is an inspiration to all who come in contact with it.

Paronto and Renner were further honored by receiving invitations to play in the annual Missouri-Kansas games at Kansas City, Mo.



THE GRIDIRON...

The Fort Hays Tigers started the 1940 grid schedule with a bang by trouncing McPherson College 32-0 in the season's opener. Hindered by a series of injuries and tough breaks they soon lost their scoring power, however, and wound up the season with a record of 3 wins, 3 losses and 3 ties.

Following their opening victory the Tigers fought Oklahoma City University to a 6-6 tie and then made their Central Conference debut, losing a close one to St. Benedicts 6-0. Stepping out of the loop again the Tiger eleven regained its power temporarily and added Sterling to its list of victims by a 13-0 margin. In their second conference start the local eleven held a strong Emporia State team scoreless until late in the final period when the visitors pushed over a touchdown to hand the Tigers their second conference defeat. After this heartbreaker the Tigers tied a pair with Greeley, Colo. 0-0 and the teachers of Peru, Nebraska 7-7.

Disgusted with tie games and losses an inspired Tiger eleven upset the dope bucket and handed Pittsburg a 6-0 defeat for the only conference victory of the season. The Tigers dropped the final game of the season to Southwestern 14-0.

THE COURT...

Hindered by injuries and illness the 1941 Tiger quintet finished in third place in the Central Conference listings.

The Tigers opened the season on their home court by winning two non-conference games from College of Emporia 26-22 and McPherson 44-25. Christmas vacation proved too much for the team however, and they dropped a pair of hot ones to Colorado College 30-43 and 34-37.

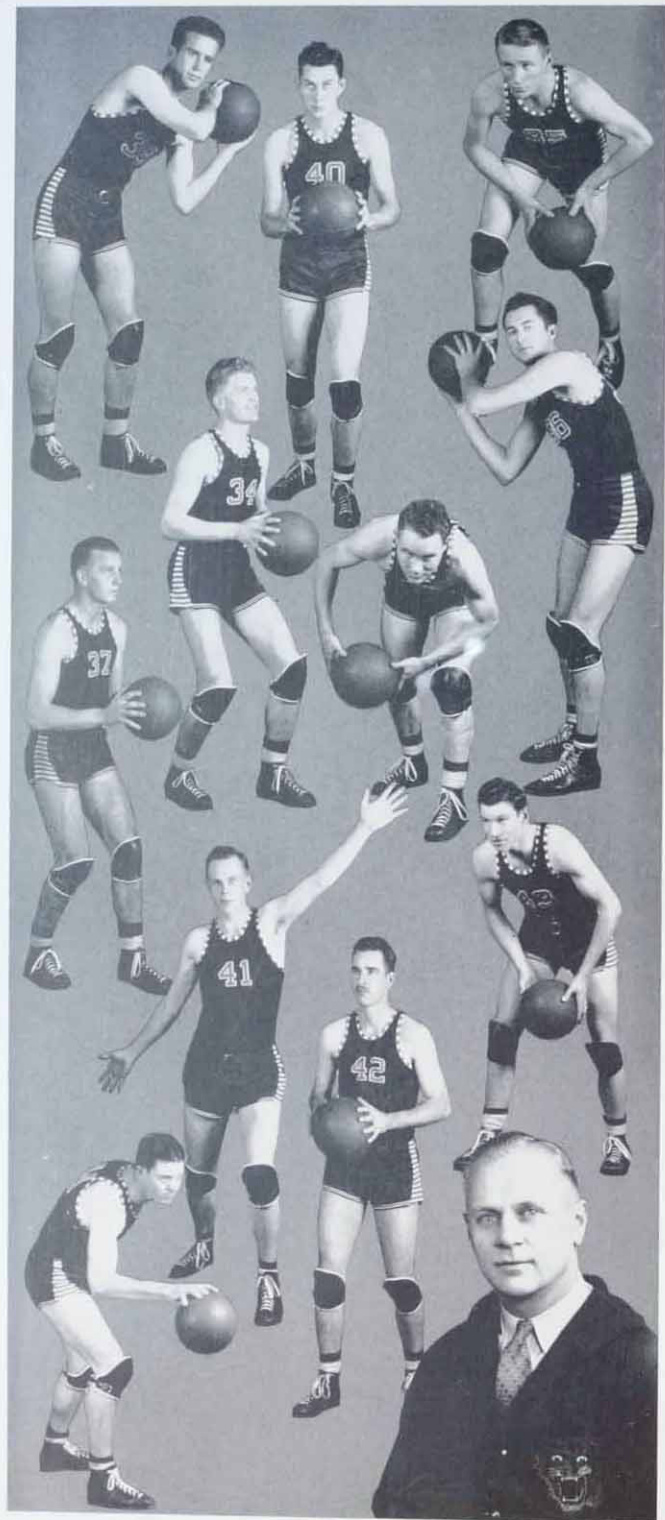
An epidemic of flu caused the scheduled game with Emporia State to be cancelled and the boys nursed colds for a week before winning their first conference tilt from Southwestern 51-41. They repeated the following week and downed Oklahoma City University 56-39 in an "indoor football game" in which a total of 39 fouls were committed.

Back in conference play again the Tigers added another victory to their list by nosing out St. Benedicts by a one-point margin 39-38. They journeyed to Emporia State for the next game and lost to the Hornets 37-45.

In a two game session with Pittsburg the Tigers lost both games, the first 43-51 at Pittsburg and 39-57 on the home court. The next week the Ravens of St. Benedicts avenged themselves by winning from the Tigers by a single point, 41-42.

The Tigers hit their stride late in the season and won their last four games. The first was a 39-23 victory over College of Emporia followed by a conference win over Southwestern by a score of 47-37. Next McPherson bowed to the Tigers 42-41 and finally the postponed game with Emporia State saw an inspired Hays team finish the season in a blaze of glory with a 51-41 win.

For the first time in the history of Fort Hays State the C. I. C. meet was held on the home course and courts, on May 16 and 17.

The golf team was strong. Three lettermen, Jim Davis, Leroy Carter, and Gene Glotzbach were back to tee off for the Tigers this spring. These three, and one newcomer, became one of the best teams in recent years.

The Kansas State-Washburn trip was the highlight of both the golf and the tennis season.

Coach Waldorf's tennis team was also strong, with four lettermen back on the courts, Dean Settles, Warren Fox, Al Mostrom, and Ivan Carrell. Carrell, after nursing a leg injury last year, was back to strengthen this year's team.

Coach William Bearley's capable track team was able for the first time in Tiger track history to compete for C. I. C. honors on the Hays track.

Ten lettermen formed the nucleus for the track squad this season. Co-captains were Ted Hoover and Everett Koelling. Other lettermen included Jim Finley, Warren Settles, John Sipe, John Hatcher, Clifford Lahman, Tom Small, Carl Fellers, and George Shipley.

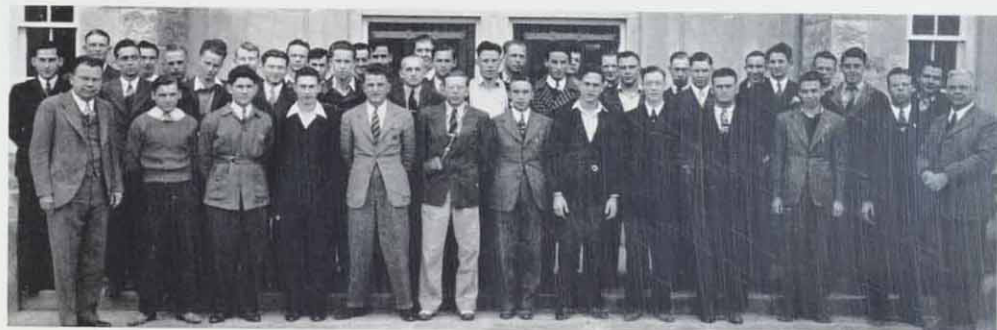
The officers are J. D. Sharp, president; Ansel Tarrant, secretary-treasurer; and Standlee V. Dalton, sponsor.

The objective of these serious minded current-events is to help create an intelligent, interested, nonpartisan public opinion through the careful study and discussion of current international situations that arise to disturb and alter the progress of modern man.

Membership in the International Relations Club is limited to thirty-five. Any student who has at least twelve hours credit is eligible for membership in this group. New members are elected to the organization by the club to fill vacancies when they occur.

Robert French was president of International Relations for the first semester. The executive duties were then taken over by Nixie Beason for the remainder of the year. Walter Stuive was vice-president and Vesta Moden was secretary.

GIANTS OF LEARNING:

The second and fourth Thursdays of each month find the members of the graduate club huddled together discussing their interests in the field of research. It is their desire to make some significant contributions in this field. Members are required to hold a Bachelor degree.

The leaders of this club are Claude Bice, president; Gwen Dimmit, vice-president; Jesse Vague, secretary-treasurer; Dr. Fred Albertson, chairman of the Graduate Council; and Dr. Myrta McGinnis and Professor Roy Rankin, sponsors.

PURPOSEFUL PEOPLE:

The members of the Newman Club carry on the ideals of their patron, Cardinal Newman, as well as the name. The Newman Club is a club of Catholic culture and Catholic fellowship organized in non-Catholic universities and colleges. The program is threefold: religious, educational, and social, stressed in that order.

Meetings are held twice a month for the study of problems pertaining either to religion or to the campus. This year the club has had a series of programs on ceremonies of the mass and liturgy of the church, using either recognized speakers or panel discussions.

As a project the Newman Club has been sponsoring a drive to raise funds for "Bundles for Britain," relief work especially for the women and children in England.

The Fort Hays Newman Club is considered the outstanding Newman Club in five states and was the chairman of the provincial meeting of the Central States of the Newman Club Federation held at the University of Nebraska in April.

The officers are Walter Keberlein, president; Joe Riedel, vice-president; Lorene Dorzweiler, secretary-treasurer; and Rev. Dennis Tarter, chaplain. Mr. James R. Start is the faculty sponsor.

ATMOSPHERE FLITTERS:

The birds and other winged creatures of the air have nothing on the fifty-five Fort Hays men and five Fort Hays women taking Civil Aeronautics this year.

Although this is but the second year of flight training at Fort Hays it is already the second largest flight school in Kansas—and one of the best, for there have been no failing students.

A first course is offered, the completion of which prepares the student for a private pilot's license. This year a secondary course was also offered, preparing the student for a restricted commercial license.

The college has acquired two complete planes for ground study, the instructors of which are Dr. H. A. Zinszer and Dr. C. T. McCormick. The flight work on the campus is supervised by a flight committee with Dr. G. A. Kelly as coordinator.

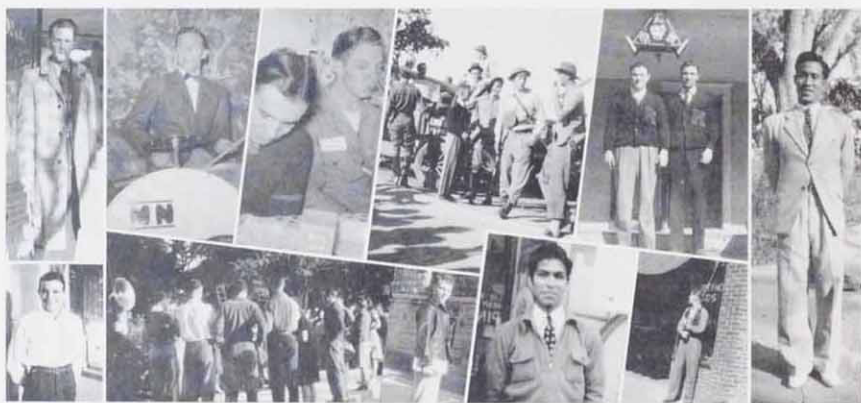
