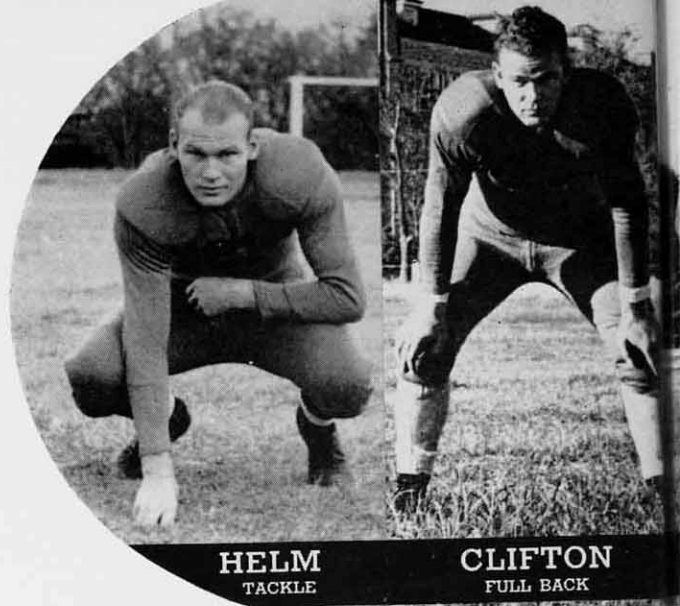
FOOTBALL

Their activities include a lively party held in the stadium each semester and a formal dinner-dance. Another popular event is the openhouse dance of alternate weeks to which all campus girls are invited.

Mrs. W. A. "Mother" Lewis ably fills the capacity of housemother for the boys. One of her many duties is the charge of the infirmary room. Also her presence at social functions provides the group with a gracious hostess.

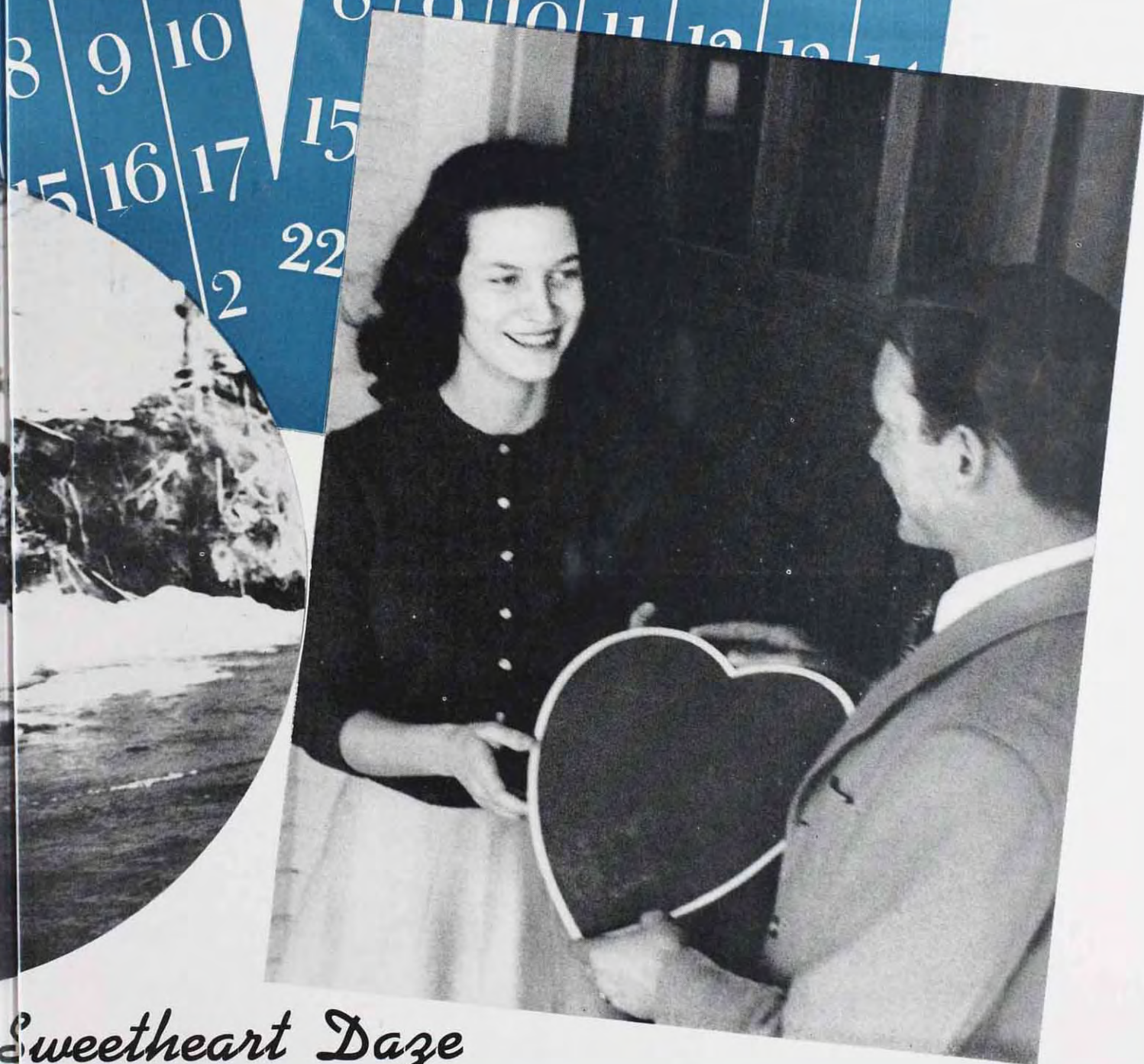

THE SQUAD



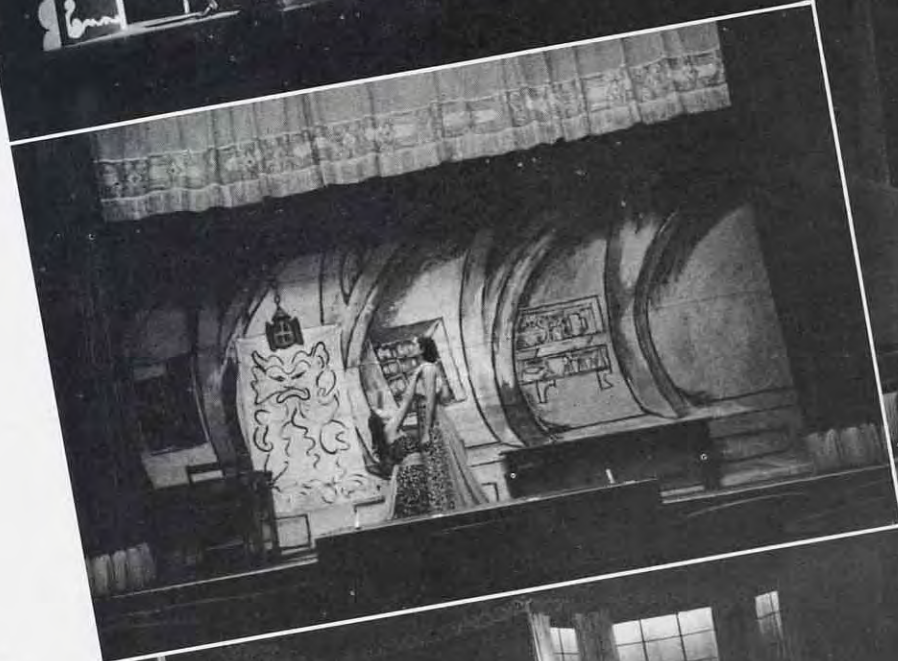

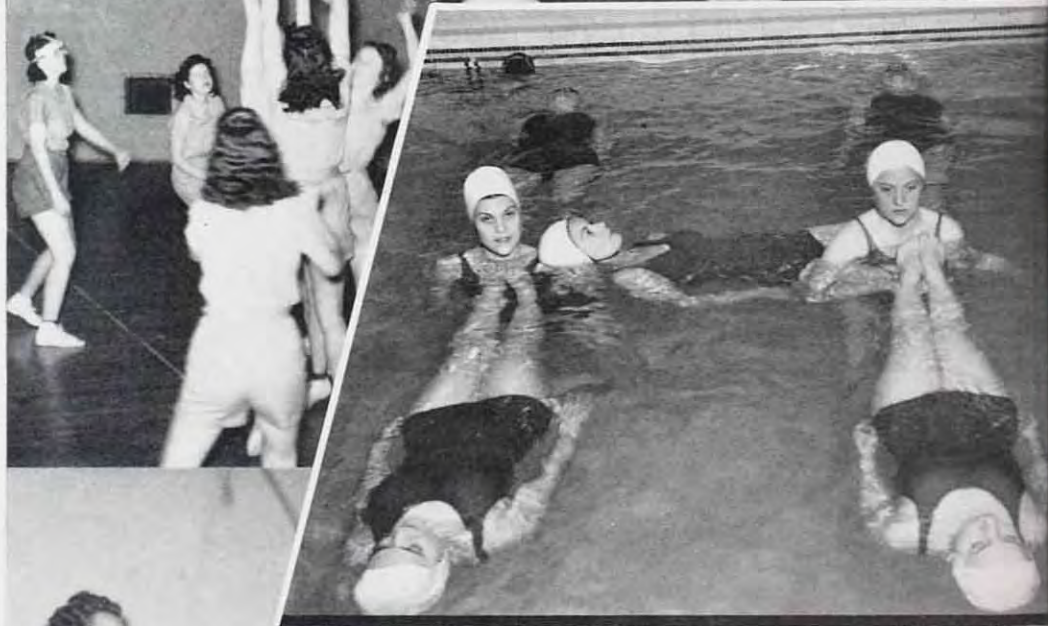

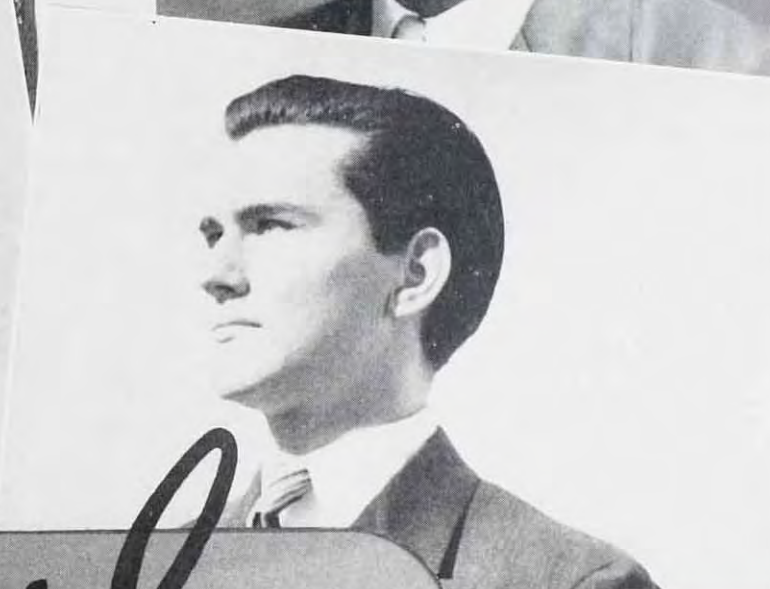

The debators who have competed in five intercollegiate debates or qualified in oratory or extempore are eligible to become members of Pi Kappa Delta, a national forensic fraternity.



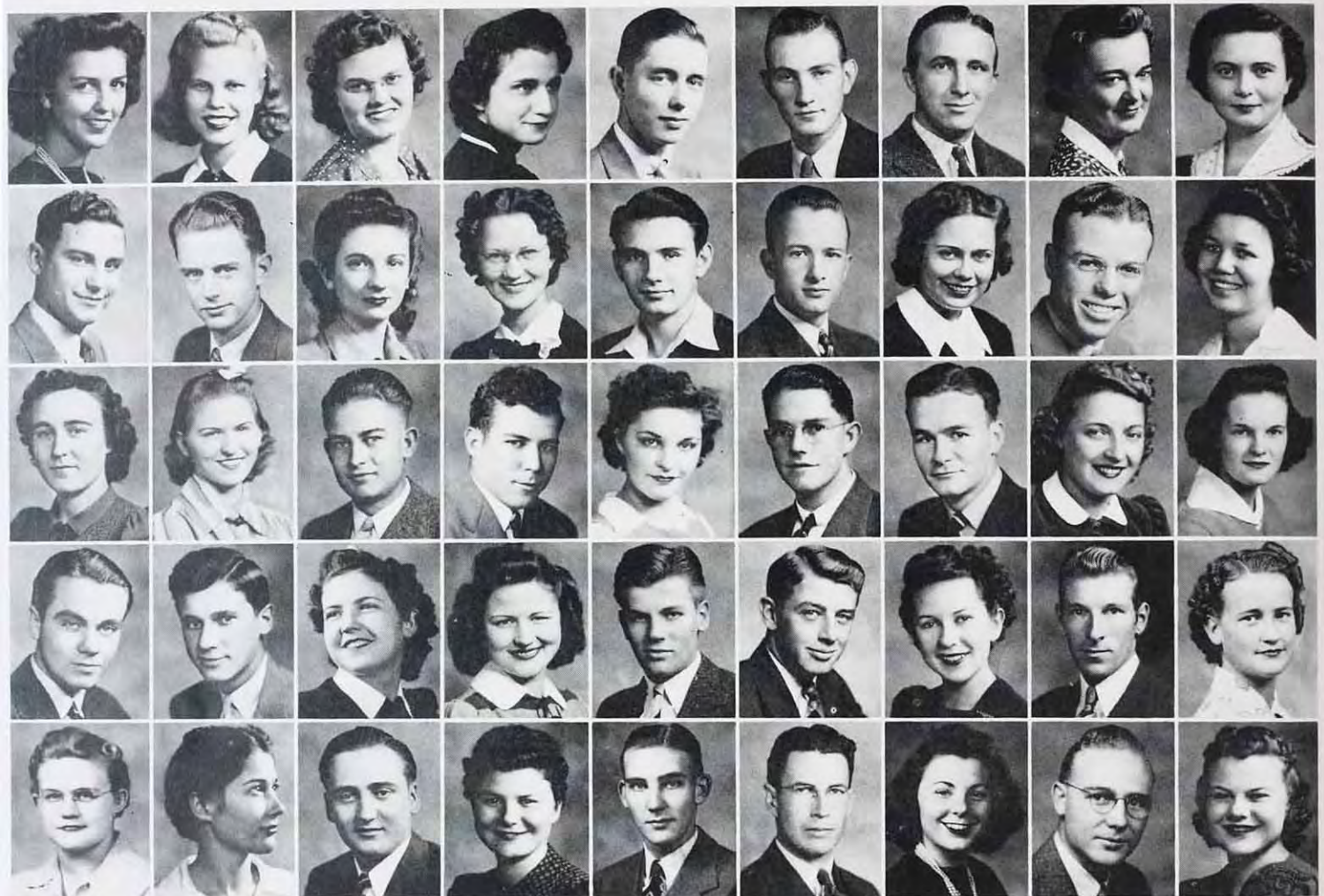

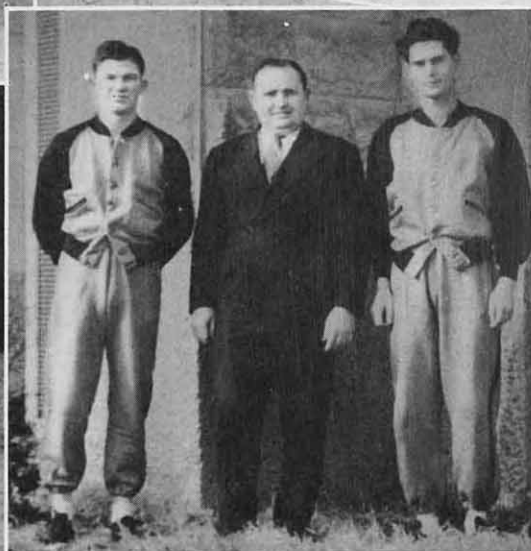
TRACK

The 1941 Central Intercollegiate Conference meet was held for the first time at Hays. The Tigers placed fourteen men in this meet, more than any similar meet in school history. Shipley won the pole vault, establishing a new school record of twelve feet nine inches.
