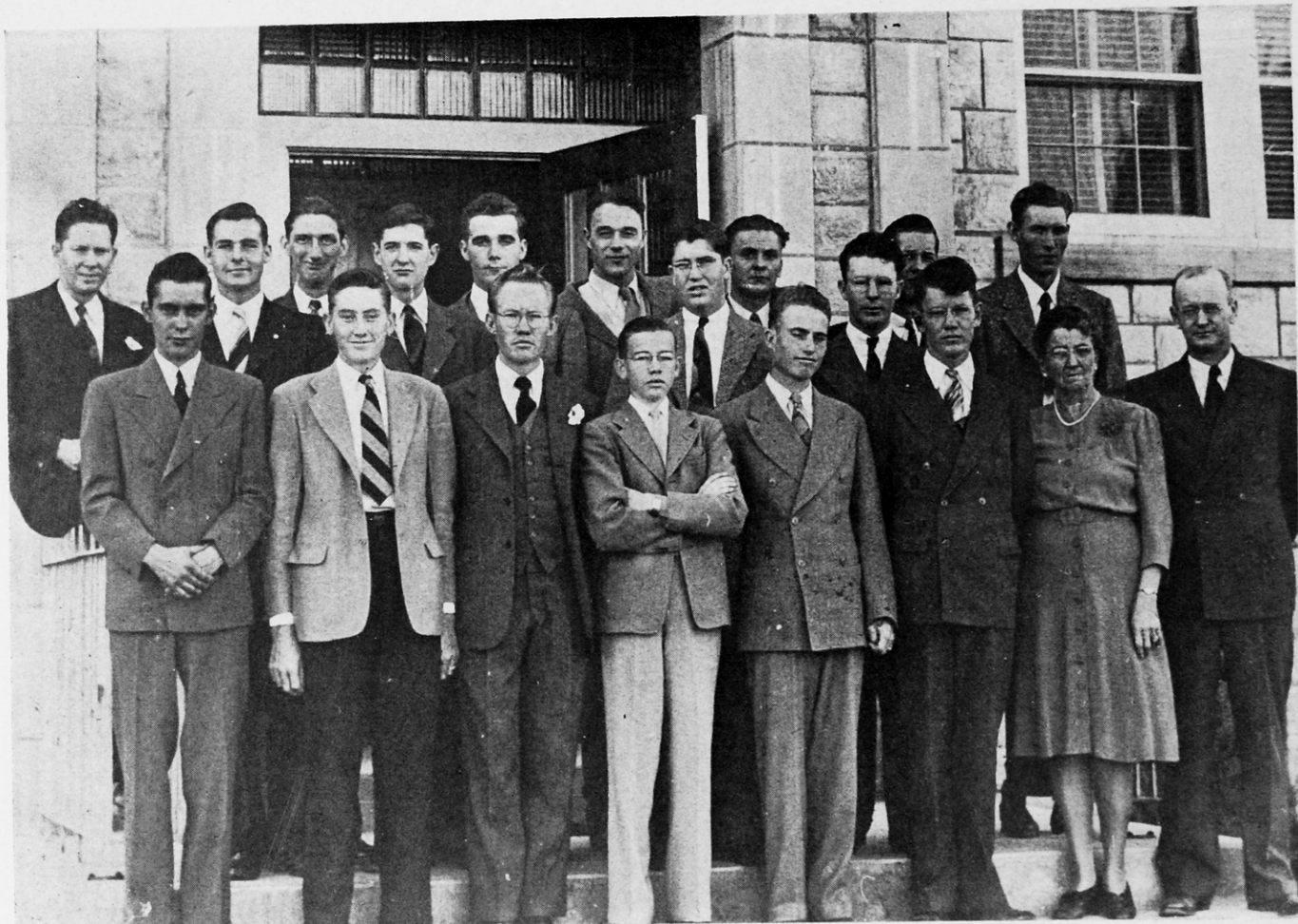
WESLEY HALL

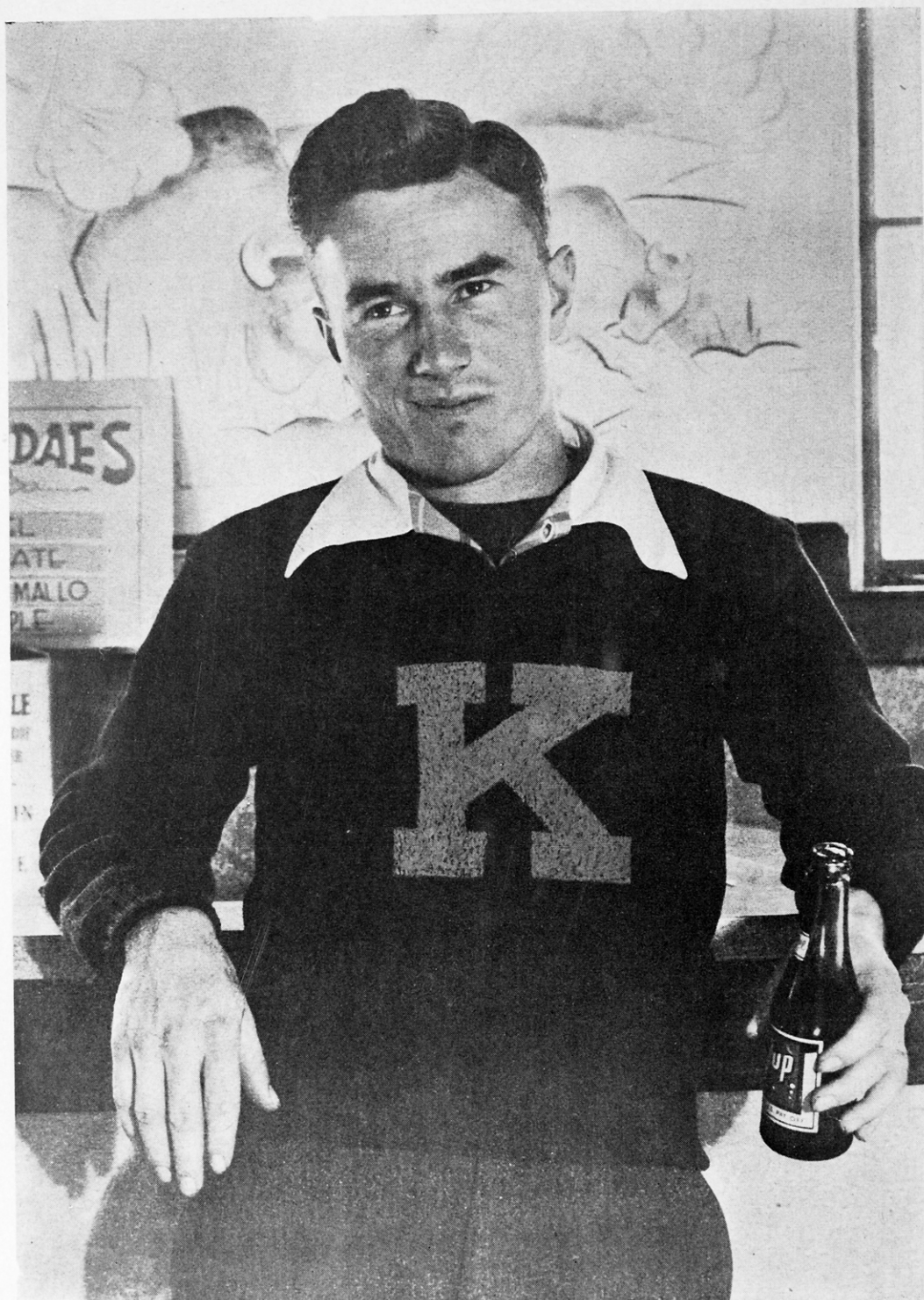


Y. W. C. A.

Women's Leadership

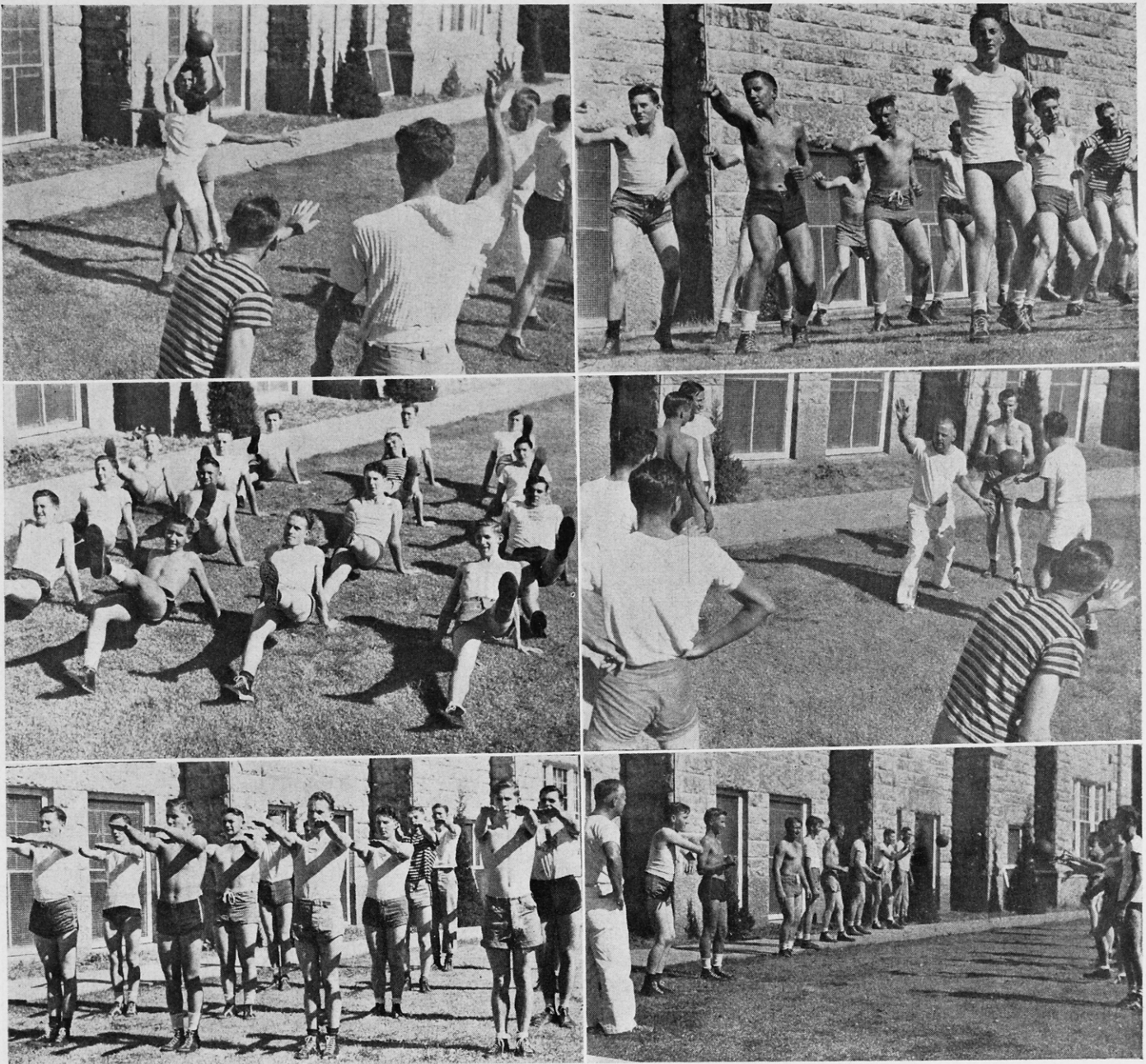
