

Tigers Entertain Bearcats in Season Opener

Tonight's season opener for the Fort Hays State Tigers brings the Bearcats of Northwest Missouri State to Lewis Field Stadium. The Missourians, with 19 returning lettermen and several prized transfers, are anxious to improve last year's 2-7 record.

Coach Earl Baker's 1961 team won two of its first three, including a tight 17-16 decision

Next Week

Next week the Tigers play host to Colorado College in the second consecutive home game of the new season, and the added attraction will be provided by thousands of high school band members and parents of FHS students on campus for Band and Parents' Night. FHS has beaten the Colorado team only twice in 12 meetings and will be out to avenge a bitterly contested 14-6 setback at Colorado Springs last fall. Kickoff time: 7:30 p.m.

over FHS. But then the Bearcats lost the final six outings in succession.

The Maryville, Mo., school got off on the wrong foot last weekend, however, with a 7-6 loss at the hands of Peru (Neb.) State. The Nebraska team, a perennial power in that state, scored in the final four minutes to down the Bearcats.

That early contest puts Baker's squad one game up on the Tigers of Coach Wayne McConnell, who are opening the season one week

In History . . .

A year ago . . .

FHS lost to Northwest Missouri at Maryville, 17-16, in a game that included every possible method of scoring in football. All 17 of the Missourians' points came in the second quarter. A safety and a two-point play after a touchdown (NCAA rules were in effect) gave the Bearcats the triumph, despite a 39-yard field goal by Tiger Don Schrock.

Five years ago . . .

FHS outscored the Bearcats, 40-27, at Maryville in a game that included little in the way of defense. Ace Tiger fullback Chuck Vernon scored three times to spark the winners' offense. The Missouri squad battled from a 40-13 deficit to the final margin with a late rally.

Ten years ago . . .

A last-quarter Tiger march was stopped one foot short and FHS lost to Maryville, 7-6, at Maryville. Halfback John Roth scored the lone Tiger TD, and Curt DeBey, Don Rorabaugh and Charles Stahl sparkled in the line.

later than usual. Another problem for FHS to fathom tonight is the seldom-seen single wing offensive pattern employed by the Missourians. Baker's crew is one of the few college teams still using the fast-disappearing single wing.

Some of the top performers for Maryville include tailbacks Joe Bell, a letterman, and Bernie Ricono, a transfer from Arizona State; end Ed Whitaker and center Duane Abbott, the cocaptains, and veteran linemen Larry Holland and Larry Timmerman. The Bearcats may also field the tallest gridder FHS will meet this season in 6-8, 235-pound end Roger Voss, who doubles as a defensive tackle.

Fort Hays State also looks for an improved season. The Tigers won four, lost four and tied one last fall, winning their final three games in a row and finishing third in the CIC. Then a post-season discovery of an ineligible player led to the forfeiture of all victories and the tie.

This season the Bengal roster includes 19 lettermen, eight top-flight transfers and a number of promising freshman prospects. There is more experience and greater depth than in recent years.


The top returnees include Dave Parker, the top rusher in the CIC last year; halfback-line-backer Jim Lee, the team's defensive leader; end Cliff Leiker, twice an all-conference choice before missing last season with an injury; fullback Steve Worley, and linemen Ron Gardner, Kirk Pope, Jim Sanderson, Larry Dreiling and Jerry Strecker.

McConnell's tentative starting offensive lineup calls for lettermen at all positions, and the defensive unit is also liberally laced with experienced Tigers.


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Dazzling Dave Parker

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



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
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Jolting Jim Lee




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


RULES CHANGES

1961's number one controversy provokes the chief rules

change



Syracuse was leading 15-14; and on the last play of the game Notre Dame tried a field goal, which failed. Time had expired on the play, but one of the officials called a penalty on a Syracuse end for roughing the holder of the kick. After a 15-yard penalty, Notre Dame tried another field goal, and this one was successful—thereby winning the game for them 17-15. After the game was over, a considerable controversy developed as to whether Notre Dame should have had another play. The rule governing extension of a period is rather long and somewhat complicated to the average fan, but there is one part of the rule which specifically states that the period shall not end if there is a foul on the last play by team B while team A is in possession of the ball. The Official N.C.A.A. Rules Interpretations contained ambiguous statements as to what constituted "possession" in the case of an attempted field goal. This led to the technical dispute that caused so much discussion last fall. The Rules Committee has now amended this rule in order to prevent any future occurrence of such a rhubarb. They have simply eliminated that part of the rule which reads, "a foul by team B while team A is in possession." In other words, if team B fouls team A on the last play of the game this year, team A gets another play regardless of whether they had kicked or passed the ball.

Among the other changes which will be noticed by you astute fans are the following:

TEAM A MAY NOW DOWN THEIR OWN SCRIMMAGE KICK WITHIN TEAM B'S 10-YARD LINE WITHOUT PENALTY.

For many years, team A has not been permitted to touch its scrimmage kick within team B's 10-yard line without penalty. The penalty was a touchback which gave team B the ball on its 20-yard line, first and ten to go. In years gone by, one of the great weapons in offensive football was a good kicker who could get that ball high enough to get his ends down the field and far enough to put it close to

the opponent's goal line. If the ends were successful in downing the ball close to the goal line, team B was in the hole with their back to the wall. Because of the fact that there was vicious blocking by both teams, around the ball, the defense blocking out the offensive players in the hope that the ball would roll across the goal line for a touchback, and the offense trying to block out the defensive players in an attempt to get at the ball, the rule was put in the book restricting the offensive team from touching the ball within team B's 10-yard line. The Committee has now decided to change the rule back to where it was many years ago with no restriction on the kicking team attempting to down their own kick. So, we can assume there will be plenty of action on a punted ball near the goal line this season.

PENALTY FOR ILLEGAL SHIFT REDUCED FROM 15 YARDS TO 5 YARDS.

This is the second time this penalty has been changed in the past several years. On many plays there is a very fine distinction as to what is an illegal shift, which carries a 15-yard penalty, and an illegal motion, which carries a 5-yard penalty. Most officials are reluctant to take 15 yards away from a team on a borderline decision for an infraction no more serious than one which carries a 5-yard penalty. For this reason, it is quite possible that there were illegal shifts which were not penalized. By reducing the penalty on an illegal shift from 15 yards to 5 yards, it is now in the same category with illegal motion and will probably be penalized more frequently in the future.

"DELIVER A BLOW" INSERTED IN THE DISQUALIFYING FOULS RULE.

Last year, the disqualification rule stated that no player should strike an opponent with his fist, extended forearm, elbow or locked hands, or kick or knee an opponent. Penalty—15 yards and disqualification from further participation in the game. Apparently, the language of striking an opponent with extended forearm, elbow or locked hands was not strong enough, so they have inserted the words "deliver a blow" with extended forearm, elbow or locked hands which is quite clear in its language.

PENALTY FOR ILLEGALLY KICKING A BALL IN PLAYER-POSSESSION INCREASED FROM 5 TO 15 YARDS.

Last year, the penalty for illegally kicking a ball in player-possession was 5 yards from the spot. This year, the rule has been changed to 15 yards from the previous spot. In other words, if a defensive tackle broke through the line of scrimmage and deliberately kicked the ball out of the hands of an opponent who was holding it for a place kick, the penalty would now be 15 yards from the spot where the ball was snapped. The rule also goes further and states that this year no player shall deliberately kick a forward pass. This is a good trick if you can do it, but not in the eyes of the Rules Committee, as they have prescribed a 15-yard penalty from the previous spot for such an act. The penalty for deliberately kicking a free ball remains the same — offended team's ball at the spot of the foul.
