Welcome To Tiger Country



Tonight's Game

Fort Hays State kicks off its 1976 season tonight in hopes of ending an eight year winless streak against the Rangers from Northwestern Oklahoma State University.

The last time the Tigers beat Northwestern was in 1968. Although they did manage to salvage a tie in 1972, but otherwise the Rangers have been too much for FHS. Northwestern slipped past the Tigers last year at Alva by a 21-20 margin and now lead the series 7-5-1.

The Rangers began their season last Saturday as they were crushed by Abilene Christian University, 48-14, at Abilene. NWO fell behind by a count of 28-7 at halftime as its defense couldn't stop the well-balanced attack of the Wildcats. The Rangers offense did manage to roll up 340 yards in total offense against ACU with 74 yards coming on the ground and 266 via the air. However, the Ranger defense gave up 353 total yards which included 199 yards through the air.

NWO's attack is led by the signal calling of quarterback Terry Ingmire. The Rangers have a fine group of running backs behind Ingmire. They include Reggie Williams, Willie Webster,

and Brian Clothier. Ingmire's favorite targets are Clothier, wide receiver Ronnie Jones and tight end Craig Swaggerty.

Williams enters tonight's game as the Rangers' leading rusher with 61 yards on 12 carries.

Ingmire has hit on 15 of 27 passes for 193 yards and one touchdown. Clothier has grabbed seven of Ingmire's passes while Jones has hauled in six. The offensive line is headed by two-year starter Mike Smith at center. Defensive NWO relies on the hard hitting of linebackers Mike Dean, Glen Richardson and Bobby Hall.

FHS Head Coach Bill Giles figures to start Scott City senior Skip Numerick quarterback. Joining him in the backfield will be last year's sensation Tom Doll, a sophomore from Claflin; senior Craig Horchem from Ness City;

and senior slotback Gary Campas from Leoti.

On the offensive line, look for Great Bend junior John Barnard at center; Grant Neb. junior Mike Carlson and Lubbock, Tex. junior David King at the guard positions; Atwood senior Robb Ross and Ellinwood sophomore Lynn Koch at the tackle spots; Ness City senior Chuck Durfee at tight end; and Gering, Neb. junior Dave Meter at split end.

Defensively, Giles will probably put Great Bend junior Jeff Good at nose guard, Claflin junior Jim Homolka and Pleasanton, Neb. freshman Bob Heider at the tackle spots. Filling the inside linebacker positions will be Minden, Neb. senior Dave Thom and Kiowa junior Fred Gillig. Scheduled outside linebackers are Goodland junior Ron Busse and Stockton freshman Jerry Harding. In the secondary will be cornerbacks Mike Mlinar, Norton senior and Blond Farmer, Russell junior. The Tiger's strong safety is Kent Griffin, Douglas, Wyo. senior and the free safety is Robert Douglas, Amarillo, Tex. junior.

The place kicking chores will be handled by Jetmore junior Brian Shriwise. Punting for the Tigers will be done by either Durfee or Hutchinson freshman Tom Harmon.

A Look Ahead

Fort Hays State opens its Central States Intercollegiate Conference schedule next Saturday when it travels to Kearney for a night game against the Antelopes. The Tigers have not fared too well against Kearney State the past couple years with the Antelopes winning the 1974 contest 26-14 at Kearney and then coming to Hays last year and squeaking out a 10-7 victory.

The Antelopes lost three backs from last year's starting backfield. Gone are quarterback Dick Schwenka, Randy Butts, the team's leading rusher and fullback Bill Simon. But Kearney can make up for this absence with its stubborn defense which allowed only 216 yards total defense per game last season. That mark was the best among old GPAC team members. The Antelopes open their 1976 season this afternoon with a home game against Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

Following the Kearney State game the Tigers will return home for a Saturday evening conference game with Missouri Southern College. The Lions opened their season last Saturday by defeating CSIC foe Emporia State 28-6.

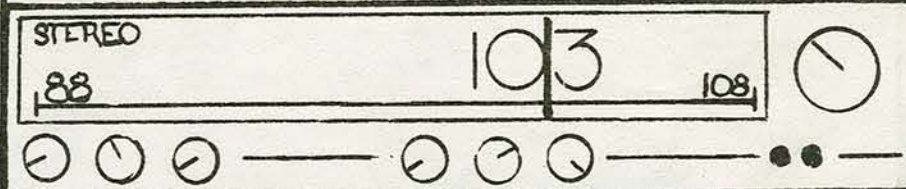

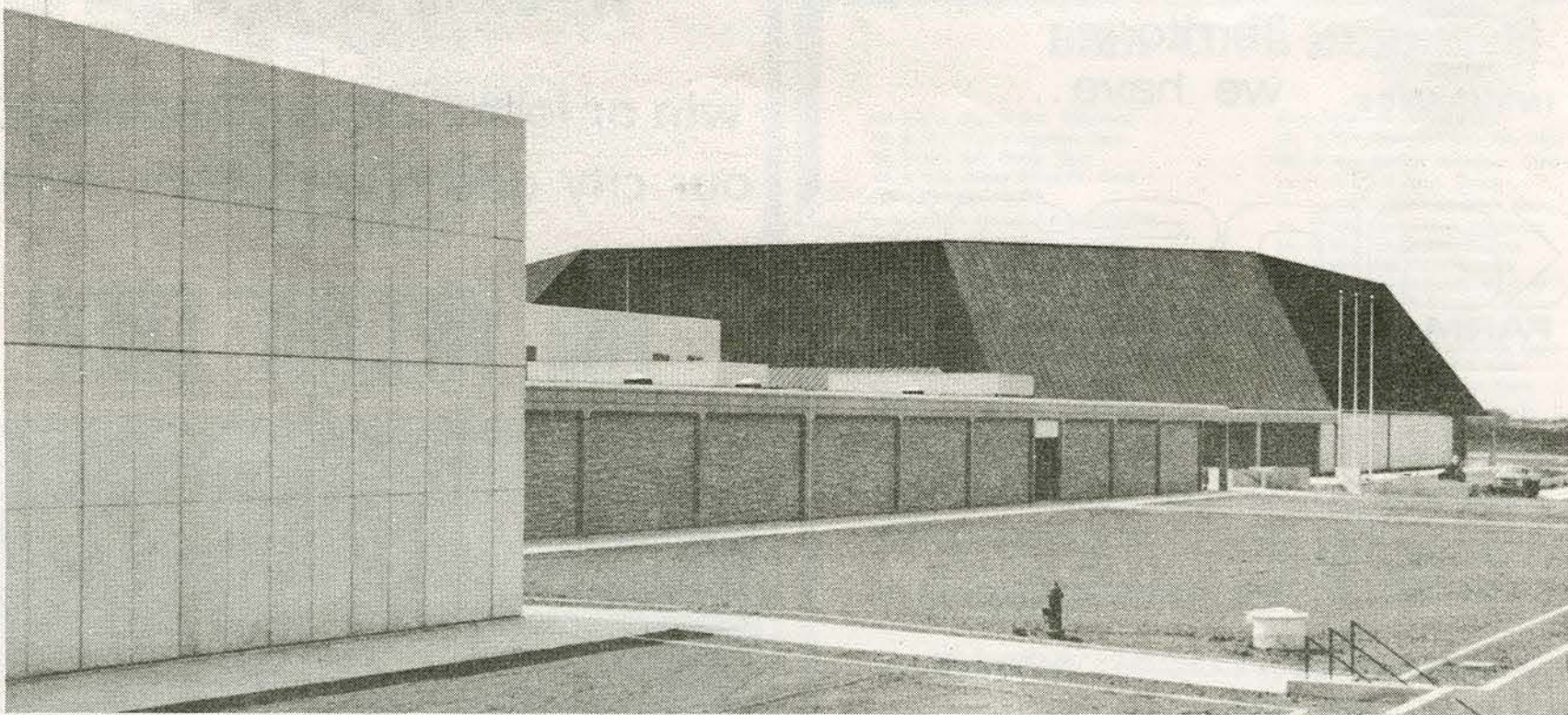
In addition to watching our fine football team this season, you will also enjoy the entertainment of three groups during home games.

Offensive Backs

When the Tigers go into action during 1976, one of the most potent weapons will be the play of their offensive backfield. With two of the three backfield positions occupied by starters from last year, FHS Head Coach Bill Giles feels he has a strong base to start from.

However, the remaining position to be filled is that of the quarterback spot and Giles must find someone to replace Greg Custer who decided not to return to the squad this year.

"We should be strong at the fullback and tailback positions this season with the return of letterman Craig Horchem and Tom Doll," Giles commented, "but the players we have fighting for the quarterback job are of unknown quality as far as game experience is concerned."

Tailback Tom Doll will start the new season after winning many honors last season. Among them were All-Conference, All-District 10, NAIA Honorable Mention All-America and Associated Press NAIA Honorable Mention All-America.

"Tom's already proven himself,

Giles said. "His records from last year speak for themselves."

Ready to back Doll up will be sophomore Scott Downing. Giles says of him, "All Scott really needs is experience in order to make him a complete player."

Leading Doll into the line again this year will be fullback Craig Horchem who was a big part of Doll's success in 1975. According to Giles, "Craig is a good blocker as well as a good power runner. He can get you the tough yards when you need them."

Horchem's backup will be

freshman Dale Kandt who has recovered from a broken leg suffered during spring drills. "Dale is very quick off the ball and is an above average blocker," Giles commented.

The quarterback spot has been hotly contested during the pre-season between transfer Skip

Numerick, returnee Louis Pfortmiller and incoming freshman Pete Kriwiell and Mike Lybarger. Giles has finally given the starting nod to Numerick

because he has proven he can do the job very well.

"Numerick proved in the alumni game and in practice that he is a very capable Performer as a passer as well as a runner," Giles said.

"Pfortmiller is also a fine runner and can execute the option well. Kriwiell and Lybarger are both exceptionally fine prospects for freshman. Their problem will be inexperience."

All eight offensive backfield players came to FHS after outstanding high school sports careers. Downing and Kandt both enjoyed standout seasons on their high school teams. Downing at Ellinwood and Kandt at Chase.

Doll was a high school All-American in football at Claflin and received All-League and All-State honors in the same sport. He

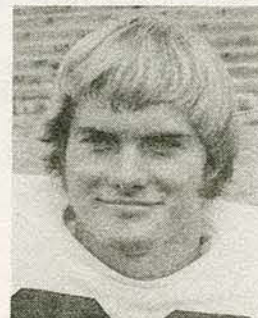
was a three year football letterman as well as being a two year track letterman.

Horchem was an All-State selection in football his senior at Ness City High. He also won All-Conference Offensive and defensive honors both his junior and senior years.

Numerick lettered three years in football and two years in basketball and track at Scott City. His senior year he won Honorable Mention honors in both football and track.

A 1975 graduate of Natoma, Pfortmiller lettered all four years in football, basketball, and track. He was an All-State Honorable Mention selection in football his senior year.

Lybarger was named All-

FHS Ranks High

Fort Hays State's high national finishes in cross country, indoor track and gymnastics during the 1975-76 season earned the Tigers 14th place in the NAIA All-Sports competition.

In the national championships, FHS placed third in cross country, 10th in indoor track and fifth in gymnastics which accounted for the Tigers' 87 points in the all-sports standings. Eastern New Mexico won the 1975-76 All-Sports Championship for the third consecutive year with 159 points.

FHS won the NAIA Area III and District 10 competition with its 87 tallies. This marked the third straight year that the Tigers claimed the District title and in 1973-74 they placed fourth in the nation.

The Tigers are among 520 NAIA-member schools eligible for the annual competition which began in 1969-70. Of the total membership, 218 schools tallied points in last season's events.

The points collected are based

on the finish in the 16 NAIA Championship events with the top 32 teams in each championship receiving points on a graduated scale.

Following Eastern New Mexico in the standings were the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, Texas Southern University and Edinboro State College (Pa.).

Rounding out the top 20 were Adams State College (Colo.), U. of Wisconsin-Parkside, Simon Fraser U. (Canada), Bemidji State College (Minn.), Henderson State U. (Ark.), Eastern Washington State College, Central Washington State College, Oregon College of Education, Jackson State U. (Miss.), FORT HAYS STATE, Pacific Lutheran U. (Wash.), West Liberty State College (W. Va.), U. of Wisconsin-Stout, Ouachita Baptist U. (Ark.), Gustavus Adolphus College (Minn.) and George Mason U. (Va.)

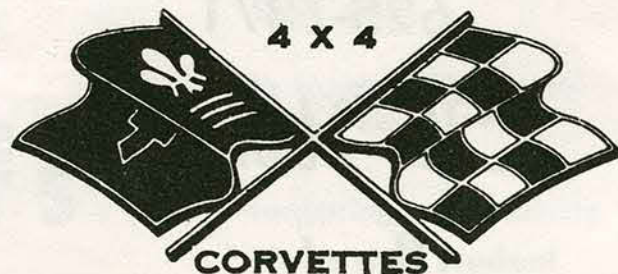

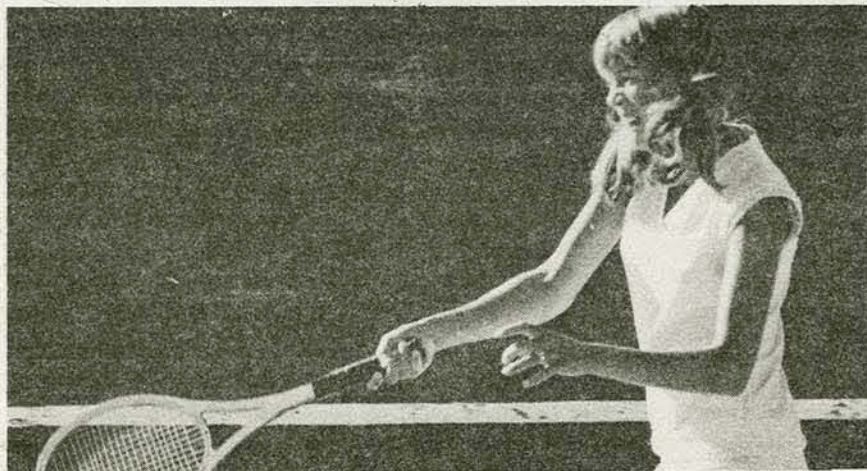
Tennis Prospects

Rick Zimmerman, a 24-year old native of Denver, Colo., has assumed the duties of Fort Hays State baseball coach, replacing Earl Hobbs.

A two-year baseball letterman at FHS, Zimmerman will be completing his master's degree while coaching the Tigers this season. He graduated from FHS in 1975 with a B.S. in physical education.

Zimmerman, who transferred from Mesa (Colo.) Junior College, competed for the Tigers in 1973 and 1974, the year FHS placed fourth in the NAIA National Championships. Following his senior season he was named to the All-NAIA District 10 team as a pitcher while he received District 10 honorable mention recognition as third baseman his junior year.

An assistant baseball coach at FHS last spring, Zimmerman's

most recent coaching assignment was this summer when he led the Hays Larks to a seventh place finish in the National Baseball Congress Tournament. He also coached the Hays American Legion baseball squad during the

What Is The NAIA?

The basic concept upon which the philosophy of NAIA is focused is that the inter-collegiate athletic program of member institutions be an integral part of their total educational program, subject to the same aims, policies and objectives as are the other departments of their program.

The total intercollegiate program must be the full responsibility of the President and his administrative staff who must be in full control of the financial policies and procedures which govern the athletic program. A sound athletic program should be sponsored with the basic purpose of providing the benefits of participation in athletics to as many students as possible. Gate receipts, through essential, should not be the primary objective of their athletic program. Intercollegiate athletics must fully justify being a full member of the educational family of the member institutions and, properly administered, provide benefits to the athlete and the institution worthy of institutional acceptance and financial support.

For those institutions wishing to organize and administer intercollegiate athletics as a part of the total educational program,

NAIA was established to provide opportunity for competitive competition on the highest level of ability with National recognition through the program of sixteen National Championship events.

Academic policies have been adopted which assure that athletes fulfill their responsibilities as students and within a five year period are required to receive academic degrees. The NAIA has adopted rules and standards which require a student athlete be fully eligible in every intercollegiate contest in which the institution participates. This is the highest academic requirement of any organization

administering intercollegiate athletics.

The NAIA is so organized that the major responsibility for administration of rules and standards lies within the thirty-two Districts through a carefully selected Eligibility Committee. In like manners, the thirty-two District committees have the major responsibility to administer the broad participation program consistent with nationally adopted policies.

The National events program structure makes it possible for any qualified member institution to compete in these events. However, income from all National events, as well as all other income, is used for the benefit of the total program rather than for only the individual

institutions who participate in National events. At the same time, member institutions have a deep responsibility to give preference to the NAIA program in their consideration of participation in post season or National events.

The philosophy of NAIA is geared to those colleges and universities which administer their programs on a sound and financial basis. NAIA is not in competition with any other organization.

The NAIA has 520 four-year, degree-granting institutions including 42 affiliated conferences in its membership. A total of 16 National Championships will be sponsored for active NAIA member colleges and universities each year.

It was a time for Americans to relax ... to seek diversion and to be entertained. The Civil War was over, President Johnson was impeached; tried and finally acquitted, and citizenship was granted to former slaves.

Lewis Field Stadium

With the bi-centennial year of 1976 upon us nothing could be more traditional than the sights and sounds of college football. Each Saturday in the fall, stadiums across the country are filled with cheering crowds rooting for their favorite teams. And for nearly 40 years, Lewis Field Stadium has been the site for this festive atmosphere of crowds as well as being the home of Fort Hays State football.

Lewis Field Stadium was a dream that started to become a reality on May 29, 1936. On that date the Kansas Board of Regents designated 25½ acres on the southeast part of the campus as Lewis Field in honor of William Alexander Lewis, president of Fort Hays State from 1913 to 1933.

The land had formerly been used as the Golden Belt Fairgrounds and was purchased by the college in 1932. The Board of Regents also approved the building of a stadium on Lewis Field as a project of the Works Progress Administration. Bonds were issued and the idea to provide FHS with modern athletic

facilities began to take shape.

FHS President Clarence E. Rarick thought it was feasible to include a dormitory in the stadium project, and R.U. Brooks, superintendent of buildings at the time, designed the structure. It was patterned after a stadium-housing project at Louisiana State University.

Living quarters for 75 college men were built under the east stands of the stadium and were moved into in September, 1937. Construction costs of the entire facility were estimated at \$175,000. East and west stands and an outside wall were built of native Kansas limestone.

Also included in the design were a quarter-mile track circling the field and a glass-enclosed pressbox atop the east stands. Improvements made in later years were a clock and flagpole, drains, seeded areas, sidewalks, a west pressbox, and restrooms, storage rooms, ticket stands and fences on the west side of the structure.

Lewis Field Stadium seats more than 7,000 spectators in its two stands. Bleachers behind the south end zone accommodate

several hundred more fans. Spacious locker rooms for both the home and visiting teams now occupy most of the area beneath the east stands. Concession stands, restrooms and trainer's facilities are also located under the stands.

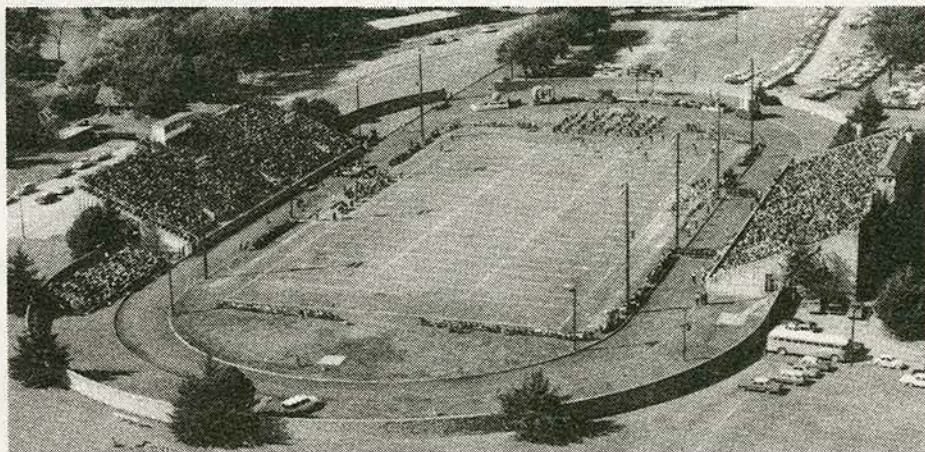
The two pressboxes provide areas for radio teams, film crews, statisticians, visiting scouts, and sportswriters. There are outlets for field phones and telephones in both pressboxes.

In the spring the Tiger track and field team finds the versatile stadium suited to its activities. The eight-lane cinder track and the straight away extending from the northwest corner serve the running events. For the field

events, there are asphalt runways for the pole vault, long jump and high jump pits plus concrete surfaces for the shot put and discus.

Time has tampered with the appearance of Lewis Field Stadium as it has been changed to serve a growing college through the years. Its stone walls have weathered with age and fail to glisten in the bright sunlight anymore. When it lies empty it seems to echo the sounds of its happier moments.

But one thing remains the same. When a football crowd fills the stands and the excitement of the game fills the air, it could be 1937 again. Only the fans are different. Lewis Field Stadium hasn't really changed at all.

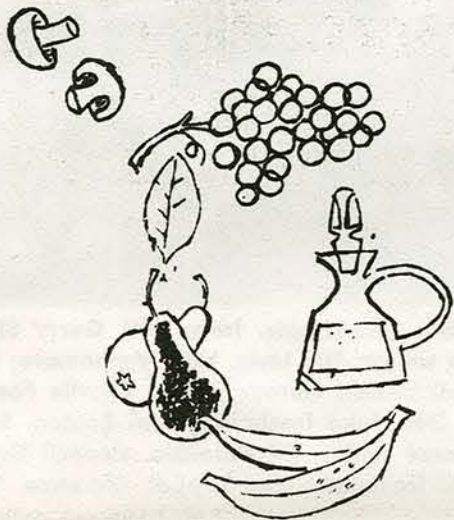

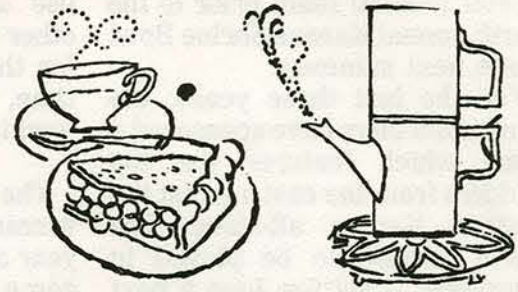

Shrine Camp At FHS

Fort Hays State has been selected as the camp for the west all-star football team prior to the fourth annual Kansas Shrine Bowl Game next summer.

For the last three years, the Kansas Shriners have sponsored a game which features the top gridgers from the east against the western Kansas all-stars. The fourth contest, to be played in Lawrence, is set for June 9 next summer.

Two weeks of practices precede the game and for the first time,

FHS will host the west squad. Beginning May 29, the squad will use Lewis Field Stadium and other campus facilities to prepare for the grid battle. At the same time, the eastern team will be working out at Ottawa University.

The west team has a two-game winning streak on the line this year after the east won the initial game. Last summer, the west claimed a 28-24 victory and the year before the squad downed the east, 3-0. In the first meeting, the

east edged the western Kansans, 16-14.

Selected by a panel of 10 sportswriters (five from the east and five from the west), the squads include 33 of the top graduated seniors from each half of the state. The state is divided by Highway 81.

"Head coaches for the annual

event are selected from the previous year's Shrine coaching staff," according to Mervine Laman, executive director of the Shrine Bowl. "The assistant coaches are chosen from the rankings in the state high school playoffs. We select one coach from each of the five classifications — 1A through 5A."

Summertime Miner

Imagine yourself entering an elevator and 1½ minutes later hopping off 876 feet below ground just to go to work. Fort Hays State's Kent Griffin did just that this summer in a uranium mine.

Griffin, a senior strong safety from Douglas, Wyo., along with former Tiger football player Bruce Van Petten from Derby worked for a mining firm in central Wyoming near Casper. The pair became aware of job openings at the mine through a friend of Griffin's who he had played football with in high school.

During his first weeks at the mine, Griffin worked as a laborer carting beams and boards to the other miners. Following the second week, he did some work as a driller and handling dynamite.

Safety is of constant concern to the miner. The day before Griffin began work at the mine a man died in a mining accident. Griffin stated, "Miners were required to attend safety meetings once a week the miner would be equipped to deal with emergencies. There were two shafts in the mine, a regular shaft and a vent shaft. In case of a cave-in, the vent shaft would be used to

evacuate trapped miners. Each miner was provided an air respirator to filter carbon monoxide in case of fire."

Radiation was a hazard the miners faced. Urnium is a radioactive mineral, therefore, the air was checked each week for radiation. If the air had too much radiation, mining operations were suspended until the radiation level went down.

Falling rock presented another problem. "The rock would crack and disintegrate because of being exposed to air," Griffin com-

mented. "Also, the ground moves some and this movement contributes to the amount of falling rock."

In reference to what he liked least about working in the mine, Griffin replied, "When I worked in the shaft, water seepage was so bad it was as if someone was dumping a bucket of water over your head."

Griffin worked a six-day, 48 hour work week. There were three shifts daily and the miners rotated shifts every two weeks.

Although this was the first summer Griffin had worked in the mine, he indicated he would like to go back after he gets out of school. Griffin was quick to point out one reason he liked the job was because "it wasn't hot down there."

Griffin has lettered three times on the Tiger Football squad. An all-around athlete at Converse Co. High School, he was all-conference and all-state in football, and all-conference and all-district in basketball.

Hoss does feel though, that Doll's success has had an effect upon the people of Claflin. "I think Tom's success has encouraged others to see him play, especially those from his hometown," he replied.

As much as Hoss likes to see Tom play, there's one game this season he knows he'll miss. "My daughter is getting married October 16 which is Homecoming Day," Hoss said. "We had thought of changing the wedding date. In fact, my daughter was willing to switch her wedding date, but we finally decided against it."

With Hoss's son Ben attending FHS this year you can bet Basil will be in Hays for every game he possibly can. "With Ben being a freshman, we now have a place to meet for our 'pre-game warm-ups'," he chided.

"Tom's something else to watch," he added. "I'd go to see him play even if I wasn't his uncle."

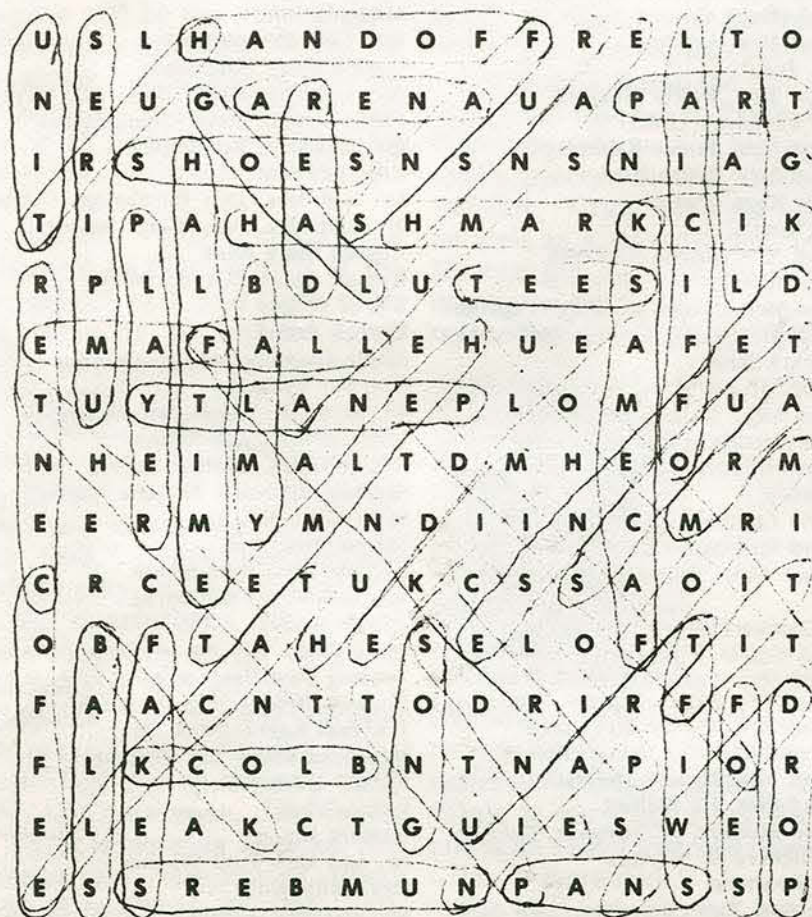
