Special Courses Attract Over 300 to Campus

Over 300 students are participating in 10 three-week workshops, an eight-week institute and two short workshops at FHS.

Workshops

Workshops which opened June 2, and their directors are: aerospace education, Dr. Gordon Price; conservation, Thaine A. Clark; drafting aids, Dr. C. Richard Cain; economic education, E. J. Spomer; high school publications, Katherine Rogers; programmed learning and teaching machines, Dr. Dale Dick; Spanish, Dr. Reginald C. Reindorp; teaching geography, Charles Roome; new arithmetic, Dr. Orin L. Gladman; and watercolor, John C. Thorns, Jr.

Dates for later workshops will be from June 22 to July 10, and July 13 to July 30.

Institutes

The National Science Foundation has granted \$58,000 to Fort Hays State for the mathematics institute which runs from June 1 to July 31.

Composing the staff at the institute will be Jimmie Rice; Dr. B. W. Broach; Calvin Foreman, department of mathematics, Baker University; and Wilmont Tolson, director.

Mrs. Margaret Reynolds of Lawrence High School spoke at the first seminar.

Among those participating in the \$31,400 grant from the National Science Foundation are teachers of college chemistry. This institute will be held from June 22 to July 31.

This course will acquaint teach-

ers of first year chemistry in new developments, encourage original study and investigation, and will give teachers an opportunity to discuss their mutual problems.

Dr. Harold S. Choguill, professor of chemistry at FHS, who is directing the institute, will be assisted by Dr. Hubert L. Youmans, Dr. Max Rumpel and Dr. Doris V. Stage.

Other Workshops

A two-week workshop in supervision of student teaching began Monday and continues through June 19.

The workshop is designed primarily for teachers who are serving or who expect to serve as cooperating teachers in a student teaching program.

Areas being stressed include the student's program prior to student teaching, the cooperating school's role, the college's role, the college supervisor's role and the cooperating teacher's role in student teaching.

Dr. B. W. Broach, associate professor of education, is director of the workshop in supervision of student teaching.

Monday was also the first day for sessions in a five-day home nursing workshop which continues through tomorrow.

Special training is being given in methods of teaching care of the sick and injured.

Leora Stroup, chairman of the division of nurse education, is directing the workshop which is presented by FHS in cooperation with the American National Red Cross.

12.6 Per Cent Increase Hikes Enrollment Total to 1,791

A 12.6 per cent increase over last summer's enrollment of 1,590 at the end of the first week of the summer session boosted this summer's enrollment to 1,791 at a comparable date.

A total of 715 men are enrolled, an increase of 40 over last year's enrollment.

The number of women students has increased 161. This year, 1,076 are enrolled, compared to last year's 915.

Increase in the number of graduate and post-graduate women account for a major share of the jump. Figures tabulated by Registrar Standlee V. Dalton show a 79 hike for graduate and 30 for post-graduate women.

"The freshman class also showed big increases, indicating that more high school graduates are beginning their college careers early," Dalton said.

The number of freshman men rose 54.8 per cent, from 31 to 48, and the 115 freshman women registered now is a 22.3 boost over 1963's total of 94.

Enrollment figures at this time also include those people who have pre-enrolled for later summer workshops.

Here is this year's enrollment by classes with 1963 totals in parentheses:

Freshman, 163 (125); sophomore, 155 (267); junior, 276 (256); senior, 481 (437); graduate, 523 (455); post-graduate, 150 (120); unclassified students, 36 (10); and no-credit students, 7 (20).

Dalton said he expects the final enrollment to approximate last year's 1,868.

Wesley Foundation has given permission for the students to smoke in the basement.

The spacemobile is a specially designed panel truck which carries equipment and materials used in the talks. A few of the areas covered in the lecture are explanations of manned space flights, weather satellite programs, and spacecraft for exploration of the moon and planets. Actual scaled models are being used.

Lynn Burris of the State Park and Resources Authority will be guest speaker at the faculty luncheon Monday noon in the Trails Room. A question and answer period will follow the speaker's talk. Much interest concerning the proposed expansion of the Cedar Bluffs Dam and Webster Park areas is anticipated.

Harry Mitchell, another school teacher and Harvard grad, completes the trio. His banjo, combined with the others' guitars, provides the instrumental accompaniment.

Bruce Hoppe, a young folk singer from Kansas State University, appears in the second of the Artists and Lectures Series Tuesday evening.

Hoppe, a pre-veterinary student from Chicago, plays the harmonica and accompanies his singing of blues and American folk music with the guitar.

This performance will also take place in the Memorial Union at 8 o'clock in the evening.

Allan Atlas, concertina virtuoso, and Jo Mirasola, lyric soprano, resume the series on June 24 with a 9:15 a.m. performance at Sheridan Coliseum.

Atlas is a graduate of Hunter College in New York City and is currently working on a master's degree at New York University.

He has appeared in recitals and as a soloist throughout Eastern United States and Canada. Atlas

has recently performed on radio, television and in Broadway productions.

Miss Mirasola has been in demand recently at summer stock theaters in the East. She has performed in "West Side Story," "Carousel," "La Boheme," and "The Chocolate Soldier" in addition to oratorio, concert and recital appearances. Miss Mirasola recently received a scholarship to the Juilliard School of Music.

Zoologists Tour N. Mexico For Mammal Specimens

Dr. Eugene Fleharty, assistant professor of zoology, Elmer Birney, Satanta, Tony Mollhagen, Scott City, and John Farney, Kiowa, spent May 26 to June 1 in the southern mountains of New Mexico on a montane mammal study and research expedition.

John Farney is working on bats for his master's thesis and the primary concern of the expedition was to obtain as many kinds of montane mammals as possible for use in research and study.

The group obtained a total of 310 animals with 175 bats of 10 different species. The animals obtained will be preserved and placed in the Museum of the High Plains for use in study and research by interested persons.

Lab School Has Record Total in 5-Week Session

Summer laboratory school for elementary age children sponsored by FHS commenced Monday for its five-week term at Lincoln school with a record enrollment of 301.

Dr. Edith Dobbs directs the school. Bob Archer, principal of Wilson school, heads the laboratory. All of the 18 staff members are experienced teachers and hold their master's degree. Sessions opened Monday and will continue through July 10. Classes are held mornings Monday through Friday.

The laboratory provides a variety of directed learning experiences during the summer vacation. Activities do not duplicate the work of the regular school term. Two classes are being offered at each level from kindergarten through the fourth grade. There will be one fifth grade class, one for sixth and seventh graders and one special education class for students ages 8-12.

Building visual and auditory skills is the theme for the special education class. Other classes are concerned with dramatics, reading skills, modern math techniques, space concepts, and one of the most popular is the typing class for the fourth grade students.

The classes being offered and the teachers are: using play equipment and materials creatively, Jeanette Beard, Hutchinson; experiencing creative and dramatic play, Kay Hicks, Wichita; exploring modern math concepts through manipulation and discovery, Lura Rucker, Oklahoma City; extending

communicative skills through science, Donna Harsh, Hays; enriching reading through the use of tape recordings, Elouise Miller, Hays.

Interpreting the environment through the arts, Donna Firguain, Oklahoma City; developing space concepts, Doris Mays, Smith Center; planning activities to develop independent reading, Wenona East-erly, Alva, Okla.; typing and the new arithmetic, Kathryn Billings, Salina; typing for children, Sophia Bley, Hutchinson.

Providing varied experiences for creative reading, Edith Hallengren, Hays; enriching basic mathematical concepts, Warren Macy, Hays; building visual and auditory skills, Lena Knoche, Hutchinson, special project in reading, Jeanne Kuhn, Hays; art, Eleanor Caldwell, DeKalb, Ill., and music, Phyllis Schleich, Hays.

Permits Required For Campus Parking

Only holders of parking permits and registered stickers are allowed to park in certain specified areas on campus.

In Area I permits are required. Area I takes in the territory bounded on the east by the center of Park Street, on the west by College Drive, on the north by North Campus Drive, and on the south by South Campus Drive.

In Area II permits are not required, but it is necessary to have registration stickers to park there. Area II includes Lyman Drive south from Agnew Lane, Dwight Drive, Custer Drive and any other marked or unmarked streets west of the center line of Elm in the housing block. All parking lots by the housing units are included.

Bill Jellison, dean of men, cites two important exceptions to the college parking regulations:

- (1) Anyone may park in the lot west of the Union after 2:30 p.m.
- (2) Anyone may park anywhere on campus after 1 p.m. on Fridays.

Normally approximately 1200 parking permits are issued during a summer session, although there are only about 700 spaces available on campus. No traffic jam occurs, however, because persons with permits do not all use them at the same time.

Uruguayan Receives Tour Scholarship

A FHS student from Uruguay, Martha Aguirre, has been awarded a \$160 scholarship by the Kansas State Teachers Assn. to participate in the annual Kansas Agriculture, Business, Industry and Education tour which will start Monday.

The two-week tour, sponsored by the Kansas Chamber of Commerce, will include stops at about 40 Kansas colleges. This is the third year the KSTA has awarded a tour scholarship to an international student attending a Kansas college or university.

Miss Aguirre came to FHS last fall and is majoring in sociology. She made a 2.42 grade average during her first semester and was active in the International Relations Club. She holds an IRC scholarship and recently headed the IRC delegation which attended the Model UN meeting at the University of Oklahoma.

Students Display Work In Davis Hall Gallery

Art work by Liberal High School students is now on display in the second floor Lounge-Gallery of Davis Hall. Dick Fisher, a former FHS industrial arts major, is their instructor.

The exhibit, which will be displayed until June 19, shows work done this year by the students of grades nine to 12. This will include media in jewelry, leather crafts, mosaics, ceramics, sculpture, design, drawings and graphics.

Workshop students who are now studying watercolor will display their work June 22 to July 10 at Davis Hall.

PTA Leaders Meet for Workshop

A one-day Parent-Teacher Leadership workshop was held Tuesday in the Memorial Union.

This was the fourth of the five PTA leadership workshops scheduled in various regions of Kansas during June. Workshops have already been conducted at Manhattan, Emporia, Pittsburg and Lawrence.

Special features of the workshop included the president's message by Mrs. Quentin Nelson, Chanute. She spoke again at the 10:30 a.m.

session on "The Image of the PTA."

Another feature of this meeting was an address by Lorin E. Sibley, state director of U. S. Savings Bond Division, Topeka, on "Thrift Education."

Dr. Leslie L. Thomason, director of market research of Cessna Aircrafts, Wichita, addressed the group at 2:20 p.m. on "Preparing the Bigger Man for the Shrinking World."

Study groups were conducted by members of the state board of managers of the Kansas Congress for Parents and Teachers.

FHS Thespians Receive Summer Drama Grants

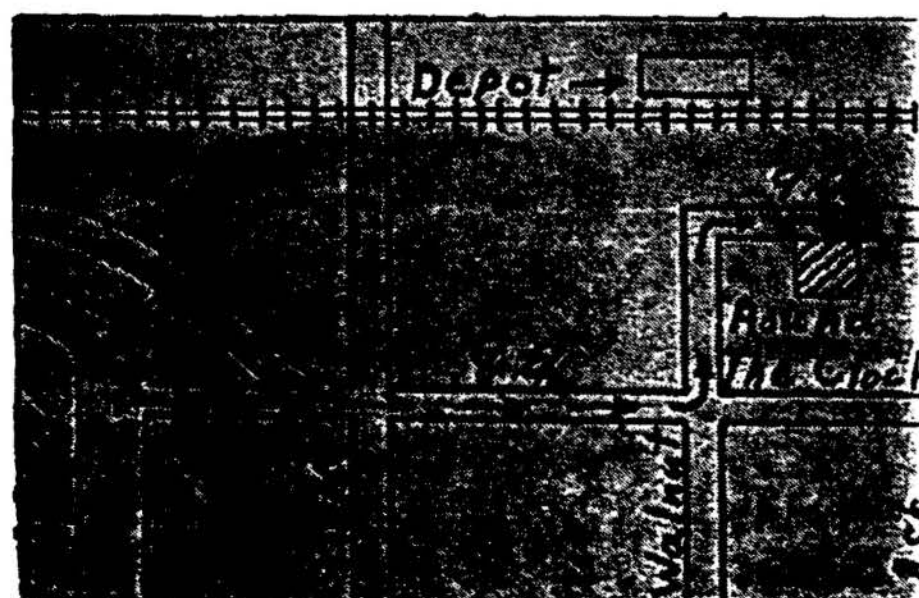
Two FHS dramatics students are among 15 chosen to participate in Southern Illinois University's summer theater program.

Tiger Thinclads Register Best NAIA Finish in FHS History

Schmidt and Williams tied for third place in the high jump with leaps of 6-6.

Harms placed fourth in the 800-meter run with a clocking of 1:50.4. He led all qualifiers with a 1:51.7 in the preliminaries.

Lakin claimed fourth place in the 3000-meter steeplechase with a 9:34.7 time and registered fifth in the 5000-meters in 14:41.6.

Emporia State, CIC champion this year, won its first NAIA track championship, compiling 60 points. E-State took runner-up honors in 1962 and 1955.

In a tune-up meet before the NAIA, Harms led FHS's entries in the Missouri Valley AAU track meet May 25 at Shawnee Mission North High School by winning the 440-yard dash in 49.7.

Lakin finished second in the three-mile run with a 14:49.5 clocking and was fifth in the mile with an unofficial 4:24.

Plainville freshman hurdler Ron McKown ran third in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles in 55 seconds.

High jumpers Schmidt and Williams tied for fourth at 6-2.

The Tiger mile relay team ran second. Runners were Joe Twyman, Overland Park sophomore; Dennis Mannering, Smith Center senior; Schmidt and Williams.

Harms also placed second in the 880-yard run with an unofficial 1:52.8, just seven-tenths of a second over the school record.

The Tiger tracksters established 14 school records, seven indoors and seven outdoors, during their 1964 campaign.
