The meeting was called to order by the chairman, E. R. McCartney,

Minor in Speech Correction.

Dr. McCartney explained that a meeting was held in February with Dr. Miller of the University of Wichita and members of our faculty in which the speech correction minor was discussed. Dr. Miller proposed an extension of the services of speech correction in Kansas by a plan for affiliation with the speech correction departments of the two colleges so that the M. A. degree in speech correction could be granted at Fort Hays Kansas State College. Part of the advanced work would be taken at the Institute of Logopedics of the University of Wichita and transferred to Fort Hays State.

There is considerable demand for people with speech correction training and especially in connection with the exceptional children phase which is being sponsored by the state department. This is growing rapidly and teachers have not been available.

Dr. Herndon met with Dr. Palmer and Dr. Miller in Wichita and courses and a minor were formulated which would be acceptable. See the attached report which Dr. Herndon presented. She suggested that Speech Correction 58 be changed to Articulatory Defects 158, and that the following courses be added:

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The Speech Department recommends that the following course numbers be made available to graduate students:

- Introduction to Techniques 159
- Dysphonia 163
- Application of Techniques 164
- Audiology 175

(Description of these courses are on Dr. Herndon's report.)

This was discussed, and it was suggested that there probably was not enough demand at present to offer a minor but that the need should be growing.

RECOMMENDATION: Mr. Brooks moved that the speech courses and program requested by Dr. Herndon be approved. Seconded and carried.

Minors in Radio, Theatre, Speech Correction, and Public Speaking be established as outlined below:

The attached report from Mr. Start was presented to the Senate and discussed. It was suggested that these seemed to be very rigid programs and that there was no overlapping of courses from one minor to another. The radio section was discussed for sometime and it was decided that no action should be taken on this question but to ask Mr. ~~Heater~~ ^{Start} to meet with the committee next week and explain the need, etc., for this demand. It was also decided that the Theatre and Public Speaking should be postponed until after Mr. Start had been contacted and the consensus of the Senate given to him.

Curriculum studies.

Dr. McCartney said that the curriculum studies were received but he wondered if there had been too much of a feeling that what is being done is all right. It was suggested that the liberal arts field would benefit if the language requirement could be fulfilled in the freshman year.

Report of faculty load.

Dr. McCartney explained that he had prepared a report on the teaching load per credit hour. Parts of the report were read and discussed. It was suggested that this sort of report for the past five years would be helpful and that will be prepared, and presented at a later meeting.
