## A Weekend of Basketball

It's hard to improve on success, but from all indications it appears that Fort Hays State has put together another exciting weekend of basketball action for its second annual doubleheader. The two-night spectacular was initiated last year and provided some of the most entertaining basketball of the season. With the strong teams clashing in this year's classic, there is sure to be plenty of action unfolding.

Two of the teams, FHS and Marymount College from Salina, return from last year's doubleheader, and two Oklahoma teams, Central State University from Edmond and Oklahoma Baptist University from Shawnee, will provide the competition. All four schools carry fine traditions in small college basketball, and in putting their talent on display this weekend, they will supply western Kansas fans with a look at the game at its finest.

Some of the most outstanding players in the NAIA ranks will also be appearing in these games. Many have won individual honors for their effort on the basketball court and several more are likely candidates for recognition this season. Individually, there is ample basketball experience and ability to provide an exciting show, but when it is put together, it means four disciplined teams will be going all out to prove they are the best this weekend.

The host Tigers are expecting several years of recruiting and molding a team to pay off this season with a good record. Six seniors give the squad great experience, and there is enough additional help to make the Tigers a very competitive team. Last season FHS built a 14-9 record, and with some added talent, the Tigers hope to surpass that winning mark.

Marymount has soared to great basketball heights in the few years it has sent a team on the court. A small school that is big in the winning tradition, Marymount has only lost 10 games in the last three years. Last season the Spartans ran up a 24-6 record and have started fast again this season with five straight wins. With a couple of all-America prospects back and new recruits filling out the ranks, Marymount is out to win a berth in the NAIA National Tournament again this season.

Central Oklahoma recorded an 18-8 mark last season and claimed a share of the top spot in the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference. However, the Bronchos lost four starters from that squad and are relying mostly on inexperienced performers in the early going. Central is the largest school of the four with an enrollment of more than 12,000 students.

Oklahoma Baptist made its first visit to Gross Memorial Coliseum last winter to play in the FHS Christmas Tourney. The Bison went on to finish with a 16-13 record and took the runner-up spot in NAIA District Nine play. With nine lettermen back the team will be hard to stop this season. The Bison are playing an independent schedule this year but become members of the Texoma Athletic Conference next season.

With four teams that play a fine caliber of basketball, this year's doubleheader should be worthy of its beautiful setting. Gross Memorial Coliseum saw its first basketball with the season opening classic last year. As the home of Tiger basketball the multi-purpose facility seats 7,000 spectators comfortably and houses spacious locker rooms and press facilities.

## What Is The Ruling?

**REBOUND:** A rebound must be credited for every missed goal if the ball becomes or continues to be alive.

A rebound is credited to a player who recovers a live ball which has missed scoring a goal (field or free). The recovery may be accomplished: (1) by gaining control of the ball; or (2) by tipping or batting the ball in an attempt to score a goal; or (3) by tipping or batting the ball to a teammate so that teammate or another member of his team is the first to gain control of it.

A rebound is credited to the team: (1) which is awarded the ball for a throw-in if the ball has gone out of bounds after a missed goal; or (2) which recovers the tip if a held ball is called after a missed goal; or (3) which is awarded the ball for a throw-in or free throw if the violation or foul has been called immediately following a missed goal.

Individual rebounds plus team rebounds equal the number of missed field goals plus the number of missed free throws after which the ball remains alive.

**TURNOVER:** A turnover occurs: (1) when a team, after gaining control of the ball, loses it to the opponent before the ball is in flight following a try for a goal (field or free); or (2) when a team, awarded the ball for a throw-in, loses it due to a violation or foul before the throw-in ends; or (3) when the opponents of the thrower-in gain control of the ball following the throw-in.

## A Look At The Tigers

The return of the top three scorers from a year ago is one reason why the Fort Hays State coaches are looking for good things to come from this year's basketball team. Several other lettermen and some promising transfers add to the bright outlook.

Depth is a key word as the Tigers have quality players throughout the roster. The list of front line candidates is headed by 6-5 Ron Crowell, who averaged 14.4 points and 8.2 rebounds last season. He is playing alongside 6-5 Greg Standish, a 12.3-point and 7.6-rebound performer. Also in the picture are two consistent lettermen, 6-6 Brent Frack and 6-7 Hal Brandenburg, plus 6-7 transfer Ed Schumacher and 6-4 freshman Mark Watts.

In the backcourt FHS also has a fine group of guards to call on. Three seniors supply the needed experience and are joined by some talented newcomers. Together the Tiger guards are capable of turning in consistent play in the backcourt. The seniors are 6-1 Brad Rumble, 5-11 Val McLean and 5-11 Keith Harper. Two transfers, 5-11 Dave Royse and 6-0 Tom Marks, have joined the ranks, and 6-3 Terry Cordes has moved up to the varsity squad.

As a team the Tigers possess good quickness and jumping ability. While they do not have a dominating big man, several players have the size and aggressiveness to give the team balanced rebounding. FHS features good shooting from both inside and outside on the front line.

Through the first two games, most of the scoring has come from the forwards with Standish and Schumacher leading the way and Crowell and Frack close behind. Injuries have hurt the performances in the backcourt, but all of the guards have filled in well.

## Bronchos Face Rebuilding

The Bronchos of Central State University, with only four returning lettermen from last year's squad, will be facing a rebuilding season under the direction of Mark Winters, who begins his 13th year as head coach at CSU.

Four starters and two part-time starters were lost from the 1973-74 squad that tied for first place in the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference with a 12-3 mark. Three of the six lost were four-year lettermen.

The only returning starter from last year is Troy Denwalt, a 6-5 junior forward. Denwalt is joined by Joe Sheets, 6-5 senior forward, Michael Johnson, 6-3 senior guard, and Stanley Burdine, 6-7 senior center, all part-time starters last year.

Denwalt, Sheets and Johnson all averaged nine points a game last year, while Burdine had a five-point average.

Three other squadmen provide the remainder of anything that resembles experience for the Bronchos. Thom Meads, 6-7 sophomore center, Terry Jones, 6-6 sophomore forward, and Roger Shorb, 6-0 junior guard are the only other players who are familiar with the Bronco style of play.

The overall size of the Bronchos will not be overpowering, but is expected to be more than enough for the type of basketball Winters has established at CSU. The Bronchos will also be working with a very small squad as only five other players are listed on the current roster.

Barring early season injuries or other mishaps to key front-line performers, the Bronchos are once again expected to be in the scramble for the conference championship.

# Championship Track Program

For the past four years Fort Hays State track and field teams have won conference championships, and this year, with 15 lettermen returning, the Tigers are strong favorites to win the title again.

Heading the list of returnees for veteran Coach Alex Francis, who will begin his 28th year as head track coach, is Gary Grubb, who was the Great Plains Athletic Conference and NAIA outdoor pole vault champion. Grubb, who is the current FHS school record

holder, was also second in the NAIA indoor meet.

Other top returnees are Steve Miller, first in the GPAC javelin; Bob Stewart, second in the GPAC shot put; Sherman Herold, second in the triple jump and third in the long jump in the conference meet, and Cyrel Foote, second in the 440-yard dash and fourth in the 220-yard dash at the GPAC meet.

Comprising the remainder of returning lettermen are Scott Tichenor, Bill Lowry, Gary Glendenning, Dwight Stoppel, Lonnie Carter and Stuart McGowne, all of whom earned all-conference honors last year, and Bob Arvin, John Beaton, Bruce Kraisinger and Paul Ide. Although Ide did not earn all-conference honors, he was an NAIA all-America on the basis of his second place finishes in the outdoor 10,000-meter walk and indoor two-mile walk.

Francis had this to say about the upcoming season and his returning lettermen, "Right now we're still the champs until someone beats us. I think Emporia State will be very tough this year and look for a four-team race for the conference title. Our team doesn't look as strong as last year's on paper, and we're going to have a lot of new people, who we don't know much about, come in and do the job."


Lost via graduation from last year's squad were nine quality lettermen, including NAIA discus champ Bob Kuhn and all-America Jon Nelson. Others lost include Tom Halbrook, Ken Bell, Dennis Kozub, Tom Weber, Ron Lawrenz, Ron Seiker, and Marv Jelinek, all of whom, at one time during their careers, earned either all-conference or all-America honors.

"Of course you don't replace a national champ like Bob Kuhn or an all-American like Jon Nelson," Francis said. "All of these people have been big point getters over the years for us and they can't be replaced in one year," he added.

As a team last year, FHS had a very successful season. Besides winning the GPAC title, the Tiger thinclads also placed third in the NAIA outdoor meet and sixth in the indoor meet.

For the first time ever last year, FHS was able to host indoor meets. The Tigers responded by waltzing through the indoor season unbeaten. Highlights of the season were dual victories over Wichita State and Northern Colorado and a first place showing in the District 10 meet.

Initial indoor action for the thinclads will be an All-Comers meet which will be held here in Hays January 18, followed by a dual with Kearney January

29. The NAIA indoor meet, which has been held in Kansas City for a number of years, will be staged in Greensboro, N.C., February 14-15.

First outdoor action will be a dual with Emporia State on March 22. The GPAC championships will be held in Pueblo, Colo. May 3, and once again the NAIA outdoor meet will be held in Arkadelphia, Ark. May 22-24.

# Tiger Booster Programs

## TIGER CLUB

The purpose of the Tiger Club in Hays is to promote and financially aid Fort Hays State's Athletic Department with its varsity sports programs. Organized in the fall of 1969, the Tiger Club has grown in membership from the original 10 persons to approximately 200 men at the present time.

Under the leadership of its first president, J. D. Williams and succeeding presidents Bill Rymph, Homer Schwarz, Harley Rhoads, and Howard Teater the club has grown steadily and accelerated its program for the benefit of the Athletic Department.

## SCHOLARSHIP CONTRIBUTORS

Fort Hays State scholarship contributors are counted on for most of the financial assistance in the Tiger

scholarship program. Each year numerous individuals and businesses are asked to participate in the athletic program through financial contributions.

Since the FHS scholarship program does not receive any state money, scholarship contributors are almost the sole means for providing financial assistance for top athletes who decide to attend FHS.

Full financial aid, which in the Great Plains Athletic Conference includes tuition, fees, books, instructional supplies, a job and one meal a day during the season, are given to football, basketball and track athletes at FHS. Other varsity athletic programs receive partial assistance to aid the athletes.

## BEEF CLUB

The Tiger Beef Club is currently in its third year of existence for the purpose of supporting FHS athletics.

Individuals who decide to join the Beef Club have two options. First, they can donate a steer to the Athletic Department or, second, they can donate \$200 to the program and the department will buy a steer in the person's name. The department feeds the stock out and when the stock is marketed and expenses paid, the profits go directly into the Athletic Department budget.

The first two years were highly successful and provided a tremendous boost for the athletic program. At the present time the fund contains \$2,000 in profits and there are 28 steers in the program for this year. With the membership in the club growing annually, the outlook for the Tiger Beef Club is progressively better.







# Cross Country Squad Ends Season

Fort Hays State's cross country squad, after getting off to a very fast start, closed out their 1974 season with a disappointing 14th place finish at the NAIA championships.

The Tiger harriers opened the season by placing fifth in the Wichita State Gold Classic, finishing behind four NCAA schools. The next week FHS successfully defended its title in the Emporia Invitational, as they edged Pittsburg State, 33-40. Pittsburg State, later in the year, won the Great Plains Athletic Conference title.

The Tigers kept rolling the next three weeks, as they posted dual victories over Kearney State, 19-40, Emporia State, 27-28, and Adams State, 27-29. However, on October 26, at the District 10 meet, FHS was beaten for the first time by an NAIA school in 1974 as Pittsburg State slipped by the Tigers, 38-53, to claim the title.

The next week FHS placed third in the GPAC meet, behind host Pittsburg and defending champion Northern Colorado. This was only the second time a cross country team coached by Alex Francis has finished lower than second in a conference meet. The other time this occurred was in 1960, when FHS was again third.

Due to bad weather the next week, FHS did not compete in the Missouri Valley AAU meet, but the next week, the Tiger harriers closed out what had been a very promising season with their 14th place finish. This marked the first time an FHS squad has not been among the top 10 teams at the NAIA championships.

Francis viewed the season this way, "We had a respectable season. Actually, we had a pretty good season, but our opposition was exceptionally good. Pittsburg State had a real fine team, as did Northern

Colorado. We just didn't meet the competition. We also never had any real consistency over the year, as shown by the fact that we had a different second runner about every meet."

Only one senior will be lost from this year's squad, but his departure will be noticeable. Ken Bell, who hails from Tonasket, Wash, was the Tigers' number one runner for the past two seasons. Bell, who was 29th last year at the NAIA meet, closed out his career with a disappointing 144th place showing at the nationals.

Making up the nucleus of this year's squad and returning for action again next year will be Scott Tichenor, Bill Lowry, Bill Filener, Dave Copp, Gary Sigle and Bob Lowen. Tichenor and Lowen have each lettered three years, while Lowry has earned two letters, and Filener, Copp, and Sigle have all lettered once.

Sigle, who is just a freshman, was the top FHS finisher at the national meet with his 45th place finish. Copp and Filener were 109th and 110th, while Lowry was 155th, Tichenor, who was 95th last year, was 177th, and Lowen, 88th last year, was 193rd.

Three other freshmen, Dennis Bartosz, Steve Herrman and Dan Smithhisler, competed sometime during the year on the varsity and are expected to push for top spots next year as the Tigers will try to rebound from a disappointing season.

## Strong Spartan Team

After being eliminated in the NAIA District 10 Playoffs last season, the Marymount Spartans are gunning for a return trip to the national tourney this year. Marymount won a spot in the nationals two years ago and has been looking for another chance ever since. That year the Spartans rolled to a 25-3 record, but dropped to a 24-6 mark last year with one of those losses ending their title hopes.

Marymount is off to an expected fast start with five wins already behind it. The Spartans have been averaging around the century mark in winning their own invitational tourney and crushing Rockhurst College and Phillips University.

The competition will be tough this weekend, but Marymount will be setting a fast pace in its march to national glory.

Now, as never before, it is a tragic and inexcusable waste to deny a talented student the opportunity to continue his or her education at the college level. One must remember that the individual is not the sole beneficiary of such education but society also benefits.

It's no longer practical or possible for many students to finance completely their college education by working part time. With limited student jobs available and greater emphasis on scholarship, today's students must spend more hours studying than ever before.

Fort Hays Knsas State College receives approximately 600 scholarship requests each year — most are from highly qualified applicants. The college can pro-

vide for less than one third of them. More money is needed for the program. With the need for scholarship dollars, the College launched into the Fort Hays State Fund Drive chaired by Dr. Richard Burnett, Class of '50. The intent of this drive for funds is to raise dollars for scholars and to encourage young people to attend Fort Hays Kansas State College.

Within several months, through faculty and student participation, direct mail, six area telethons and personal contacts, over \$15,000 of new money entered the Fort Hays State Fund. Our goal was to award 150 new scholarships for 1974. This goal has been attained.

We feel the response to our recent Fort Hays State Fund Drive for college scholarships has been prompt and generous. What is particularly heartening is the range of ages, interests, concerns and commitments by alums.

The continued greatness of Fort Hays Kansas State College will depend on the generosity of its alumni and friends. So when asking the question — What difference can one scholarship make? Why not follow with another question — What difference did the generosity of others make in your life?
