FACULTY MEETING

November 12, 1958

A Faculty Meeting was held in the Black Room of the Memorial Union at 4:00 p.m., November 12, 1958, and coffee was served from 3:30 to 4:00 p.m.

Dr. John X. Jamrich, N. C. A. Coordinator for our district, was present and discussed the Michigan Survey on Higher Education that was made a few years ago. Since a similar survey is to be made in Kansas soon, it was thought that the faculty should have a background of what other states are doing.

REMOVING DEFICIENCIES:

Dean McCartney called attention to Page 13 of the November 12, Faculty Bulletin, concerning the requirement that students remove deficiencies in English and mathematics. The material to be put in the college catalogue had been worked out by the Senate.

After considerable discussion, Dr. Moss moved that this recommendation be approved, as it appears in the Faculty Senate minutes of October 1, 1958 (Faculty Bulletin, No. 3, Page 13). Dr. John Martin seconded the motion and it carried.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

The Dean urged all faculty members to counsel with students who have low grades at the end of the nine weeks.

Mr. Spangler thought that all faculty advisers need more complete instructions and help in working with students. Dr. Ray said he would be glad to help anyone interested in becoming better advisers if they would call him and arrange a time for such work.

Dr. Marple reminded the faculty that they will be called upon to recommend superior students for the Honors Program and asked them to give serious consideration to these recommendations.
