The meeting was called to order by the chairman, E. R. McCartney.

Application for a new course. Application for the course, 170 History of
Political Theories, in political science. The course will cover an
important area of political science that has only partially been covered
by readings in the past and will provide a continuity of study in the
political science area of political theory. This was discussed.

The description of the course for the catalogue is as follows:

170. History of Political Theories. Three credit hours.
Prerequisites, 34, Jr. Std. A study of the writings and significance
of great, representative political philosophers from Plato to John Stuart
Mill with emphasis on the major classics in western political thought.

RECOMMENDATION: It was recommended that the course, 170 History of Political
Theories, three credit hours be approved. Seconded and carried.

Proposed Elementary Education Program. Dr. Wood, Chairman of the Council on
the Preparation of Teachers, presented and explained the proposed elementary
education program. He said, "that the Council recommends the adoption of an
elementary education program which is being presented by the Department of
Education. This proposed program has been carefully prepared. Departmental
advisers have been consulted and the courses listed in the concentration
areas have been designated by these individuals. The Curriculum Committee
of the Council on the Preparation of Teachers considered the proposed
program and recommend it to the Council. The Council had opportunity to
consider the proposed program at its February 20 meeting.

"The proposed program includes a broad program of general education,
concentration in two academic areas, and professional and content and
method courses." This program was discussed.

The meeting adjourned at 5:05 p.m. with the announcement that the
above program would be discussed at the next meeting, Thursday, March 8.
