Accent-reduction class offered

Speaking English can be difficult when a student hasn't been surrounded by it since birth. Often, language is a barrier to communication. But sometimes, even when it's not, even a heavy accent may make

The Herndon Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic will present an accent reduction program for international students and faculty who would like to improve their oral English skills. The clinic otters services to individuals who need speech and language therapy and evaluation.

Michelle Ross, assistant coordinator, said this is the third semester for the program, but from past experience she expects approximately 25 students

"The program is designed for students and faculty who need precise verbal skills." Ross said. "It gives them the oral interaction that is so important.

Ross, a graduate student, from Aurora, Colo , said there are many advantages to attending the class. One is that "it gives people a chance to meet other students who have probably experienced the same problems in communication before."

"It's a completely oral based class, so there's not a lot of writing," she said.

People take the course for a variety of reasons. Ross said "From previous semesters, I know many of the students were planning on using English in their native countries, to get high-paying jobs there, so, there are academic and professional uses for these skills," Ross

Students can obtain an information and sign up sheet at the clinic, in Malloy 201. Sheets need to be returned to the same place by 4 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 1. There is a textbook available for the class For more information, contact Ross, Marsha Bannister, coordinator of the clime, or Lisa Brunel.

The Gender Equity program, which caused heated and prolonged debates last year has been decided upon and implemented according to Hammond's specifications

As it now stands, \$75 will be tacked on to student tutton for the 1994 fiscal year. An additional \$50 will be added to futtion for the 1995 fiscal year and a final \$ 25 will be added on to the first two increases for the 1995 fiscal year, according to John Rziha, Tampa junior and Student Government Association

The proposal of raised tuition in an attempt to bring about gender equity between the men's and women's athletic programs was a sore point for many students last year

A poll was conducted in the University Leader to give the student body a chance to respond. The student

body voted against the idea

Student Government deliberated over the idea for many months and, in the end, could not come to an

"We ended up not passing anything, because we didn't come to a consensus," Rziha said Hammond later mandated the raise in a deliberate attempt to bring about equality for the women's

SGA has set up a board and will appoint senators to it to police the athletic departments spending as they

reap the benefits of the tuition increase. Rziha said Tom Mahon, head coach for the women's basketball team said, "I'm elated and excited that our women will have the same scholarship opportunities as their male counterparts have had. It's a step in the right




