Posters mar Homecoming campaigns

Collegiate Republicans targeted in parody

The organizational campaigns for Fort Hays State's '93 Homecoming king and queen were marred Friday morning by the discovery of obscene posters parodying the candidates sponsored by Collegiate Republicans (CR).

Many of the posters were torn down and delivered to the office for Student Development.

One poster featured a naked female in a masturbatory pose, holding a replica of an erect penis. She implored the FHSU student body to "Vote for Censorship" by voting for the CR candidate for queen.

The other showed two hald males in "Whites Only" T-shirts asking FHSU students to vote for the CR candidate for king. Penned on the shirts were the phrases, "I am a supremist-Nazi power" and "I hate you because you are not me."

The posters were put up after 11 p.m. Thursday and discovered approximately at 8 a.m. Friday around the quad and residence half areas of campus, according Herb Songer, vice president for student develop-






