The Kansas Undergraduate Research Day at the Capitol event is an opportunity for students to present their research experiences with state lawmakers in Topeka scheduled for Wednesday, February 20, 2019.

This event will showcase the work of up to 40 Kansas undergraduate students representing each of the state's eight public 4-year institutions. The purpose of this event is to demonstrate the unique opportunities undergraduate students have to participate with faculty members in research at all state institutions. This event will also emphasize higher education's role in developing educated citizens and preparing a workforce with the necessary skills to further the economic growth of the state. Undergraduate students who have been significantly involved in the research enterprise of the university either with their own project or through meaningful involvement with a faculty project are desired as participants. To qualify for this event, participants must:

- be undergraduates during the 2018-2019 academic year;
- have completed research under the guidance of a Kansas 4-year public institution faculty mentor;
- follow the methodology of the appropriate academic discipline;
- be of sufficient quality to be presented at a professional academic meeting;
- have the skills, resources, and capacity to produce a professional academic poster;
- agree to undergo presentation training and rehearse their presentations prior to the Capitol event.

Participants should be able to convey their experience and enthusiasm to state representatives, senators, and other state officials in a poster session. Projects from a broad range of disciplines are encouraged - especially posters that relate to the state of Kansas and issues important to the state legislature (e.g. education, health, agriculture, aviation, biotechnology, energy, transportation, manufacturing, environment, and social services). Up to 5 projects will be selected from each institution.

Lunch and transportation will be provided. The event will take place on the first floor of the Capitol Rotunda from 10 am to 1 pm. The public is invited to attend. Selected participants will receive additional information regarding the event.

Submissions are accepted from student teams, however only two students from the team will be able to go to the Capitol. One designated student should be listed as the Principal Investigator. The entire research team will be recognized in the program booklet and related materials.

This event will not be an adjudicated poster competition with prizes. All participants will be recognized equally for the honor of participating in this event.

Read instructions *and* guidelines (*LN menu, blue buttons*) **prior** to completing the form. Track your application progress by returning to "Faculty Development Funding" on LN Workspace.

- The annual limit for faculty who are **presenting** has been increased to \$1,200.
- **Only applications approved by chair and dean no later than November 1** will be considered in this cycle. Verify **earlier department/college deadlines** with your chair and dean.
- Bank Roll Over option is available for higher cost events (more than \$3,000) taking place in the *next* academic year (19-20). This requires applying twice, once in 18-19 and again in 19-20. Contact the Office of the Provost for details.
- *Complete and detailed responses aid committee review.*
- Funding decisions will be relayed approximately *2 weeks* following the due date.
