The Kansas Undergraduate Research Day at the Capitol event is an opportunity for students to present their research experiences with state lawmakers in Topeka scheduled for Wednesday, February 20, 2019.

This event will showcase the work of up to 40 Kansas undergraduate students representing each of the state's eight public 4-year institutions. The purpose of this event is to demonstrate the unique opportunities undergraduate students have to participate with faculty members in research at all state institutions. This event will also emphasize higher education's role in developing educated citizens and preparing a workforce with the necessary skills to further the economic growth of the state.

Undergraduate students who have been significantly involved in the research enterprise of the university either with their own project or through meaningful involvement with a faculty project are desired as participants. To qualify for this event, participants must:

- be undergraduates during the 2018-2019 academic year;
- have completed research under the guidance of a Kansas 4-year public institution faculty mentor;
- follow the methodology of the appropriate academic discipline;
- be of sufficient quality to be presented at a professional academic meeting;
- have the skills, resources, and capacity to produce a professional academic poster;
- agree to undergo presentation training and rehearse their presentations prior to the Capitol event.

Participants should be able to convey their experience and enthusiasm to state representatives, senators, and other state officials in a poster session. Projects from a broad range of disciplines are encouraged - especially posters that relate to the state of Kansas and issues important to the state legislature (e.g. education, health, agriculture, aviation, biotechnology, energy, transportation, manufacturing, environment, and social services). Up to 5 projects will be selected from each institution.

Lunch and transportation will be provided. The event will take place on the first floor of the Capitol Rotunda from 10 am to 1 pm. The public is invited to attend. Selected participants will receive additional information regarding the event.

Submissions are accepted from student teams, however only two students from the team will be able to go to the Capitol. One designated student should be listed as the Principal Investigator. The entire research team will be recognized in the program booklet and related materials.

This event will not be an adjudicated poster competition with prizes. All participants will be recognized equally for the honor of participating in this event.

The Les and Elizabeth Griffin Outstanding Service Awards were created to recognize the exceptional and dedicated staff who support daily operations at FHSU. 1. Current FHSU Employee
 - a. Employed within the Campus Operations and Services job family, either USS or UPS.
 - b. Has been employed by FHSU, full-time or part-time, for at least three years (must have at least three years of service as of July 1 of the nominating year).
 - c. Has not previously received this award in the last five years.
 - d. Will receive a certificate and a \$500 check.
2. FHSU Student
 - a. A current full-time student at FHSU.
 - b. Employed as a student employee within the Campus Operations & Services job family or as a student employee providing services for the FHSU food service.
 - c. Has been employed as a student employee by FHSU for a period of at least one year as of July 1 of the nominating year and enrolled as a full-time student for the upcoming academic year.
 - d. Has not previously received this award.
 - e. Will receive a certificate and a \$250 check (two awards will be given, one for Food Services and one for Campus Operations & Services).
3. FHSU Food Services Employee
 - a. Currently employed at FHSU food service providing services for FHSU students, staff, faculty and/or University guests.
 - b. Has been employed at FHSU food services providing services for FHSU for a period of at least three years as of July 1 of the nominating year.
 - c. Has not previously received this award in the last five years.
 - d. Will receive a certificate and a \$500 check.

‘Getting Started in UAS in Western Kansas’ is Coming to Hays, FHSU

HAYS, Kan. – Fort Hays State University is partnering with several other sponsors in bringing to Hays a workshop on unmanned aerial systems (UAS) – or drones.

The forum is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 15, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in FHSU’s Robbins Center. Registration is \$20, which includes lunch.

Applications of UAS technology have had a multi-billion dollar effect on the economy in the past five years. The workshop will bring together representatives from federal and state regulatory institutions, along with academic and industry experts, to share experiences in how best to integrate UAS opportunities and applications in this rapidly expanding industry.

Sessions will include presentations from representatives of organizations including the Federal Aviation Administration; the Kansas Department of Transportation – UAS Division; and Kansas State Polytechnic – Aviation Research Center. A panel discussion will feature 10 people who are applying UAS technology in their businesses.

Other sponsors are the Hays Area Chamber of Commerce, Grow Hays, the Kansas Department of Commerce, Kansas’ Small Business Development Center, Kansas State University Polytechnic and the UAS Cluster Initiative of Oklahoma and Kansas.

Ceramics Classes

Would you like to explore or expand your creativity in a dynamic, interactive class? Consider taking a class in Ceramics next Spring.

The foundation class Art 260: Ceramics I is offered at 10:30 am – 12:20 on Monday, Wednesday, Friday. This class features Creation Stations designed to build hand skills, followed by Deep Studio Time, allowing students to use the skills they learned in a more in-depth project. Ceramics Designed for Life introduces functional pottery, industrial products such as cell phone holders, and ceramic objects designed to enhance an interior. Ceramics as Expression begins with mask making, then

moves into solid sculpting and hollow forms before students engage the Deep Studio Experience. Finally, experimental projects explore the properties of clay, glaze and firing to produce unexpected results.

Art 360: Ceramics II focuses on the skill of throwing on the Potter's Wheel. Inspired by their favorite foods, students learn to create vessels to enhance their favorite dishes. Near the end of class, students will learn to stage and take photographs of their pots in action and develop a class cookbook. Then we eat our props. This class meets at 4:30 – 7:20 pm on Monday and Wednesday.

There are no pre-requisites for either class, as both classes start with the basics and work to develop more advanced skills. You don't need to be an Art and Design major to enroll or benefit from this creative experience. All skill levels are welcome. A studio free covers tools and materials.
