#### **Recent Increase in Spam E-mail**

Here are answers to some questions I've been asked frequently the last 2 weeks!

1. YES, we are getting A TON of spam lately!
2. No, I have no idea why. There's some buzz about increased spam and botnet activity on some of the security lists I follow, which tells me it's not just happening to FHSU.
3. Yes, our spam filter is still working. Poor thing is working really hard, and nobody appreciates it. I'll go pat it on the head later and remind it that it's a valued member of our team.
4. We've actually adjusted settings over the last 2 weeks so more mail is being blocked. It doesn't seem to be helping much, so I'm looking at some other options.
5. [BULK] in the subject of an email means our spam filter thought the email was pretty spammy or scammy, but it wasn't certain enough to block it. It tagged the email [BULK] and passed it along to a smarter spam filter (that's you!).

Here are some things you can do in Outlook to help with spam, which Outlook calls Junk Email.

1. You can **adjust the Junk Email options** in Outlook so that it blocks specific senders, or sends more messages to your Junk Email folder.
  - a. **Outlook for Windows:** Right-click an email, go to Junk, then Junk Email Options. This is also on the ribbon, in the Delete section.
  - b. **Outlook for Mac:** On the Tools menu, click Junk Email Preferences.
  - c. **Outlook on the web:** Settings gear in upper right corner, Mail (under Your app settings), Block or allow (under Accounts on the left side). There are fewer options in the web version, but this is where you can add safe senders or blocked senders.
2. You can **block all email from certain senders**.
  - a. **Outlook Windows:** Right-click an email, go to Junk, then Block Sender
  - b. **Outlook for Mac:** In the Outlook menu bar select Message > Junk Mail > Block Sender
  - c. **Outlook on the web:** Click on the email, then click the down arrow next to the Reply button. You'll see options for Mark as Junk and Mark as Phishing. There's also a button that says Junk in the top bar (next to New, Delete, Archive...).
3. You can **make sure email from certain people gets through**
  1. **Add fhsu.edu and mail.fhsu.edu as Safe Senders** in Outlook so messages from FHSU faculty, staff, and students are never classified as junk. This is in the Junk Email Options or Preferences I talked about in #1.
  2. **Add important people to your Outlook contacts.** When a contact is saved in your contacts list, Outlook does not classify messages from that email address as junk.

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## Requesting Service from Technology Services

We are pleased to announce that the old Lotus Notes CTC Request for Services\* site has been discontinued for all Technology Services requests. The new [Request Services](#) portal has been phased in during the past several months and it now incorporates all requests submitted to Technology Services.

To submit a request, simply click on the "[Request Services](#)" button on the left sidebar, located on all [Technology Services](#) webpages.

### Here are a few things to note:

- **When a form is submitted**, it creates a ticket in our KACE ticketing system and notifies the appropriate technician or workgroup. You will receive a **confirmation email** (from an @support.fhsu.edu address) and can simply reply to it if you wish to add a comment or ask a question about your request. If desired, you can also click on a link to log in with your TigerNetID to view the status of the ticket or add a comment. The technician assigned to your ticket is automatically notified when an email reply or new comment is posted.
- **Please submit all requests for service using our new request forms.** Since our technicians are now working exclusively from KACE tickets, this is the most efficient way to receive service. Direct emails and phone calls to our technicians are discouraged. Remember, you can easily **add a comment or check the status of your ticket** at any time by simply replying to your ticket confirmation email or by logging in with the link provided in your confirmation email. If you should need to call us regarding a request, please contact [TigerTech](#) and provide the ticket number for reference.
- For **technology purchases**, Cost Center Managers will receive approval request notifications and can indicate their approval by simply responding to the email (this will create a comment in the ticket).
- **The procedure for setting up new faculty and staff services has been streamlined.** You do **not** need to submit a request unless a phone and/or computer are needed for the new employee. For on-campus positions that require a **phone and/or computer**, Tech Services sends an email to the department with **specific instructions for submitting** these requests and a list of the **required information** to provide. - **Previous/old requests** will be kept in Lotus Notes, not migrated to the new request system.

\*The only form remaining on the old Lotus Notes CTC Request for Services site is used to request **reporting and data services** from the Institutional Research group in the Office of the Provost.

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## **Fort Hays State University to Host Kansas Startup**

**Friday, November 9 – Sunday, November 11**

Fort Hays State University will host Kansas Startup on November 9<sup>th</sup> – 11<sup>th</sup>. Led by the university's Robbins College of Business and Entrepreneurship, Kansas Startup is an event designed for entrepreneurs to meet, share ideas, and launch new businesses. This three-day event is open to anyone with a great idea - and the desire to make that idea a reality.

Henry Schwaller, Instructor of Management and the co-organizer of the Kansas Startup stated the weekend "is a 48 hour, hands-on experience where anyone interested in starting a business or non-profit can find out if their idea is viable. Beginning with pitches on Friday, attendees bring their best ideas and inspire others to join their teams. Saturday and Sunday focus on developing the business idea and building a viable product. On Sunday evening, teams present their product to a panel of experts for feedback and prizes."

This is FHSU's seventh Kansas Startup, with the first hosted in 2013. The event has grown from thirty-one participants in its first year to over sixty in 2017, making it the largest entrepreneurial event in the state of Kansas.

Schwaller notes that the success of Kansas Startup is based on participants' experiences. "The response to all of our events has been incredible. Participants work hard, learn a lot about starting a new venture and enjoy the outcome. Teams work Friday evening to Sunday evening, many taking few breaks and little sleep. FHSU faculty, alumni and local business owners provide input, suggestions and advice to the teams as business plans were developed. The event is challenging – and it's fun, too."

On Friday evening, November 9th, event organizers will welcome and challenge participants and begin the event with open mic pitches. On Saturday, a volunteer team of business, legal, and design coaches will be available to provide assistance,

advice and feedback to all participants. The event concludes on Sunday evening, November 11th, after participants will present their final concepts to a panel of judges.

Participants must register. Participant presentations will be open to the public free of charge at 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, November 11th. Events will take place in Robbins Center on the Fort Hays State University campus.

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## Ceramics Classes

Would you like to explore or expand your creativity in a dynamic, interactive class? Consider taking a class in Ceramics next Spring.

The foundation class Art 260: Ceramics I is offered at 10:30 am – 12:20 on Monday, Wednesday, Friday. This class features Creation Stations designed to build hand skills, followed by Deep Studio Time, allowing students to use the skills they learned in a more in-depth project. Ceramics Designed for Life introduces functional pottery, industrial products such as cell phone holders, and ceramic objects designed to enhance an interior. Ceramics as Expression begins with mask making, then moves into solid sculpting and hollow forms before students engage the Deep Studio Experience. Finally, experimental projects explore the properties of clay, glaze and firing to produce unexpected results.

Art 360: Ceramics II focuses on the skill of throwing on the Potter's Wheel. Inspired by their favorite foods, students learn to create vessels to enhance their favorite dishes. Near the end of class, students will learn to stage and take photographs of their pots in action and develop a class cookbook. Then we eat our props. This class meets at 4:30 – 7:20 pm on Monday and Wednesday.

There are no pre-requisites for either class, as both classes start with the basics and work to develop more advanced skills. You don't need to be an Art and Design major to enroll or benefit from this creative experience. All skill levels are welcome. A studio fee covers tools and materials.
