Email Policy

In December, 2018, FHSU Cabinet approved an updated email policy. The updated policy can be viewed at <https://www.fhsu.edu/policies/info-access/index>

The main purpose behind this change was to clarify the language about forwarding email. The policy now reads: “Faculty and staff are not to automatically forward their official @fhsu.edu e-mail to another vendor for themselves including their @mail.fhsu.edu Google account. Unauthorized automatic forwards will be removed by Technology Services.” We will start enforcing this portion of the policy on **Friday, March 8, 2019**. Tech Services will remove the “forwarding” setting on any account forwarded to another email system. We will also remove any mail rules that redirect email to another email system.

Security and legal requirements are the primary reasons for keeping all FHSU email within one mail system. We can’t ensure that data are being protected in accordance with FERPA, HIPAA, and other regulations when internal communications are being forwarded outside of FHSU’s control. We’re also required to report privacy breaches to our students, which is impossible to do when our internal communications are funneled to outside platforms. We’ve invested in additional security features and protection for our Outlook email system, which is why we aren’t allowing Outlook email to be forwarded to FHSU Gmail. Additionally, keeping all FHSU email within Outlook also gives us the ability to respond to litigation holds and Kansas Open Records Act requests.

Award for Outstanding Undergraduate Scholar

The Undergraduate Research Experience (URE) Steering Committee is seeking nominations from faculty and staff for the annual FHSU Award for Outstanding Undergraduate Scholars.

The URE Steering Committee offers this prestigious award to recognize undergraduate students who exemplify scholarly activity. Qualities that make a student successful in scholarly activities characterize those same qualities FHSU seeks to develop in students: original thought, creative ideas, communicating with professional colleagues, critical reasoning, analysis of research, translation of evidence into practice, and first-hand knowledge of how work is performed within a professional discipline.

The URE Steering Committee will provide **five awards**, one for an outstanding undergraduate student from **each college**. Nomination letters can come from FHSU faculty or staff, and should be submitted through [this website](#) no later than **March 3, 2019**. Any FHSU undergraduate student--including KAMS and Virtual College students--is eligible. The research project may be from the award year or past years; however, the student must have been an undergraduate student for a minimum of one semester during the award year. The nomination should describe the scholarly qualifications and products of the student--for example, published papers, professional presentations, on-campus research activities, musical/artistic performance, or other novel scholarly activity. The nomination should clarify the role of the undergraduate student in the scholarly activity. The nominator should also include the nominee's CV or resume.

Nominations will be evaluated by a subcommittee of the URE Steering Committee, who will make a recommendation to the full URE Steering Committee. Winners will be recognized during Undergraduate Research Week in April 2019.

Applications Now Open for the \$500 Lynn Haggard Undergraduate Library Research Award

Forsyth Library has officially opened the application process for the *Lynn Haggard Undergraduate Library Research Award*. This new \$500 cash award recognizes undergraduate research conducted in the fall 2018 or spring 2019 semester that incorporates the use of Forsyth Library resources and demonstrates exemplary information literacy and research skills.

On-campus, virtual, and international students are eligible and may apply by submitting projects such as undergraduate research papers, digital projects, videos, posters, compositions, and/or design portfolios and writing a short reflective essay describing their use of library tools and resources in their project. A letter of support from a faculty mentor will also be required for the application, confirming the project was completed in conjunction with an FHSU class or scholarly activity, and that it meets discipline standards. **Applications are now open and will be accepted until March 31, 2019.** The winner of this inaugural award will be announced in May 2019.

The student award winner will receive a cash prize of \$500 and will have their work featured in the [FHSU Scholars Repository](#). Noyce Summer Scholar Program

Students who have completed at least their freshman year are eligible to apply to be a Noyce Summer Scholar. The Summer Scholar program provides a **five week stipend at \$550 a week (\$2,750)** to work in the FHSU Science and Mathematics Education Institute with its summer programs for area youth. Summer Scholars will be engaged in teaching and educational outreach in science, mathematics, and technology. Additionally these individuals will have the opportunity to talk with master teachers about careers in teaching. The program is open to FHSU students, community college students, and students considering transferring to FHSU to enter the teaching profession. Selected students will need to either be a STEM major or intending to become a STEM major and an interest in exploring the world of science and mathematics teaching.

Black History Month: Muhammad Ali: The G.O.A.T.

Beyond being heralded as the G.O.A.T (Greatest of All Times), Muhammad Ali was an American professional boxer, World Heavyweight Champion, Olympian, social and political activist, and philanthropist. By many he is regarded as one of the most significant and celebrated sports figures of the 20th century and greatest boxer of all time. Born Cassius Marcellus Clay Jr. he converted to Islam and changed his name to Muhammad Ali. Ali was a target of scrutiny after refusing to accept the U.S. Military's draft to serve in the Vietnam war based on his religious and political beliefs.

In one of his greatest quotes he said, "I am America. I am the part you won't recognize. But get used to me. Black, confident,

cocky; my name, not yours; my religion, not yours; my goals, my own; get used to me.”

TILT Tip: Learning Objectives Series – 5 Evaluate

In short, "Evaluate" is the abilities to make judgements or criticism.

There are two types of behaviors related to "Evaluate": checking and critiquing. The former involves examining something to locate potential problems, and the latter involves criticizing or judging something based on criteria. Example of the former is, a mechanic checks a car to see if there is oil leak; and example of the latter is, a test driver says that the car has a low mpg, or it is too loud.

We usually use the following verbs to write learning objectives related to "Evaluate": check, monitor, test, assess, determine, measure, criticize, judge, defend, grade, justify (a decision), rank, rate, etc. Learning objectives in this level can be easily assessed by activities such as: problem-solving, case study, paper, projects.
