Your list of the volunteer workers is probably more complete than mine, as you knew most of the people from Hays, but I think I got them all. Except on Oct. 22, and those you will know.

I spoke to Alice Jean (Kaufman) ~~again~~ and she again confirmed that you may have the pump. ^(and I assume, the cement block) This will add a finishing touch to the complete picture of a country school.
