# **THESIS STATEMENT**


Connections are valuable in everyday life. Bloodlines speaks about my personal connections to my biological, adoptive, and found families, along with my heritage and what it means to be a contemporary Indigenous artist. I am not much of a sentimental person when it comes to physical objects, but I collect memories of the people closest to me. Through the process of collecting memories, I am creating a mental Rolodex of experience, people, things, and events from my life. When building my pieces, I braid these memories into the clay as I coil the form to completion. Embedding them into the clay, strengthens and solidifies these memories into reality, making them less likely to be forgotten. To me, my families are everything. From a young age, my bloodlines played a crucial role in my development as a human being. I was surrounded by people who either held me up or pulled me down. I was constantly conflicted with myself, and that helped me grow into my own person. I learned how to be unapologetic and just be me. It was through these interactions that I began to shape who I would later become. Growing up on a Cherokee Nation reservation, I was enveloped in Indigenous culture, but lost touch with that side of myself when I moved away. Recently, I found a deeper connection to my heritage and feel confident speaking to the importance of being an Indigenous artist. Using the same materials and techniques my people used before me, I am creating a contemporary body of work that represents me, my life, and personal experiences.



People and flowers are everywhere; we see them daily. To me, finding a good flower is just as hard as finding a good friend. When you finally find that special person in your life who makes you happy, it's like picking the best flower in the field and calling it your own. Flowers trigger three chemicals in the brain to make a person happy: - dopamine, oxytocin, and serotonin. Dopamine is triggered by the expectation of a reward. Blossoming flowers trigger the sense that something special is coming, that is the result of dopamine. Oxytocin is often called the bonding hormone. It creates a feeling of trust, whether it be romantic love, maternal attachment, or group solidarity. Serotonin is often mentioned in the context of antidepressants; however, research has found it to be released when a mammal advances its social importance. Serotonin is released when one feels important or prideful. Friends can do the same thing. They are there for you when you need them; they listen, learn, grow, move, and live amongst us. Friendships can have the same effect as flowers, releasing those chemicals within the brain. My friends and the people I surround myself with -my chosen family- help me be happy, releasing those three chemicals and making me feel wanted and supported.





Dallis began their ceramic journey in August 2013 with Casey TZ Smith at Crowder College in Neosho, Missouri. It was the first ceramic course they had ever taken and immediately fell in love. Upon leaving Crowder College, Dallis decided on Fort Hays State University to obtain their Bachelor of Fine Arts in Ceramics. Studying under Professor Linda Ganstrom for four years, they refined their skills, concepts, and professionalism. Dallis started graduate school at Fort Hays State University in the summer of 2020 and will graduate with their Master of Fine Arts degree in Studio Art, Ceramics with certifications in Art History and Digital Photography in May 2023. Coming from a Cherokee background, Dallis speaks about the importance of being an Indigenous artist in a contemporary world. Their work has been published seven times in literary and art magazines. They continue to apply for publications today. Dallis's goal is to become an educator, teaching about ceramics and Indigenous art. They would like to be known for their unique ceramic sculptures, collages, and photographic works which confront difficult and often personal experiences.
