2. Mr. Bibb, or his authorized representative.
3. An authorized representative from the institution; in this case, Fort Hays Kansas State College.
4. Louis Krueger, Director of Architectural Services Division (State Architect), who shall submit the names of Architects to be considered for this project and shall ~~act as a~~ consultant to the committee.

Please forward a letter designating the representative for Fort Hays Kansas State College for this committee, to Louis Krueger, Director of Architectural Services Division, State Office Building, Topeka, Kansas, 66612.

Please forward 6 (six) copies of the Classroom Building Program to Louis Krueger to provide his office with one copy, and for his distribution to Mr. Bibb and the Architects selected to be interviewed as prospects for the Associate Architect for this project.

Mr. Krueger has informed me that the committee can be expected to be called to interview the prospective Architects in about three weeks. The Classroom Building Program will be discussed with each prospective Architect, clarification of questions in the program will be made and a review of each prospective Architect's capabilities will be made as to the firms capabilities to perform the work required for this project.

Should you decide not to act as the FHKSC representative, I suggest that I should be given consideration for this appointment due to my familiarity with the Classroom Building Program and the capabilities of most of the Architectural firms and/or Architects in the State of Kansas.

At the request of Mr. Krueger, please forward the letter of appointment and the 6 (six) copies of the program to his attention as soon as is possible.
