# MORGAN WIELDS TROWEL IN HAYS CELEBRATION

*SCIENCE HALL*

Dual Event Occurs at Teachers College.

**New Library Is Dedicated and Cornerstone Is Laid for \$150,000 Science Hall.**

Hays, Kan., July 10.—While 1,500 people looked on at high noon today, W. Y. Morgan, chairman of the state board of regents, wielded the trowel in placing the cornerstone for the new K. S. T. C. science hall here.

Preceding the placing of the stone, formal dedicatory ceremony was held in Sheridan coliseum for the \$150,000 Forsyth library, completed in 1926 and named in honor of General George A. Forsyth, once an officer at old Fort Hays. A dual program was held, Dr. Arthur E. Bostwick, St. Louis librarian, giving the dedicatory address, and Dr. H. P. Cady of the University of Kansas speaking as a representative of the field of science.

Among the out of town visitors were Charles D. Cuthbert, state architect and Fred Voiland, Republican gubernatorial aspirant, both of Topeka. Following the formal program Pres. W. A. Lewis held a dinner attended by 150, including the special guests of the college.

"We dedeciate today the library of a great state institution for the training of teachers, a point of contact between our two foremost educative systems, the school and the library," said Doctor Bostwick in his address in which he emphasized the possibilities for the community service by the library.

## ARE IN NO DANGER

**Future Generations Need Not Worry Over Gas Supply.**
